Celebrating 70 Years

On December 9, 1951 a group of park enthusiasts gathered to declare directors, charter members and present a provisional constitution. Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association beginnings were quiet and simple.

Since that cold December day we have dedicated our organization to aid the interpretive, scienti2ic, and historical needs of Theodore Roosevelt National Park and have accrued over \$1,380,000 in assistance. We expanded that mission to include Fort Union Trading Post NHS (formed their own association in 1993), Knife River Indian Villages NHS, Upper Souris National Wildlife Refuge (parted ways in fall 2020 as their friends group assumed the role) and, Sully's Hill National Game Preserve (supported Sully for ten years before their friends group assumed that role in 2007).

Our commitment has produced many publications, funded countless interpretive programs and special events, established traditions such as the annual birdwalk with breakfast and

Wienbergen, Dickinson.

The purpose of the Association are listed as:

To stimulate interest in the educational activities and encourage scientific investigation and research in the fields of geology, biology, history, prehistory, and related subjects bearing on the

Theodore Roosevelt Nation Mem orial park region.

To assist in the development and maintenance of library facilities for the use of the public, the park personel and others.

To assist the development, operation and care of museums, trailside exhibits and other interpretive and educational devices.

To assist in obtaining photographs slides, movie films, and other visual aids for explaining and exhibiting facts relating to the Memorial park.

To assist in obtaining land, buildings, equipment, materials and supplies to accomplish the purpose of this association.

To publish in cooperation with the national park service technical or popular treatises dealing with

phases of investigation in or related to Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial park.

To handle, buy, and sell government and private publications on memorial park subjects.

Employ such persons as may be necessary and pay salaries charge, able as items of expense for services actually performed in order to achieve the objectives of the association.

To operate the business, and assets of the association so as to further the educational and scientific program in such a manner that the association shall not distribute any profits except for purpose as authorized under the constitution.

Any person interested in the furtherance of the purposes of the association may become a member by subscribing to its constitution and Bu-laws.

Teddy Bear Picnics, encouraged and supported research, purchased program and library supplies, provide equipment, remodeled visitor centers, offered visitors items that commemorate and continue telling the story of their visit, ②inanced visitor service interns and provided funds for housing countless volunteers. 


New Publications

Remodeling and Rejuvenating

The beginning of year brought a lot of changes to the South Unit Visitor Center in Theodore Roosevelt National Park. TRNHA's Executive Director worked alongside park employees Josh Vance and Chad Sexton on a large remodeling project.

As you may recall the walls in the visitor center have been painted red and wallpapered white since the late 90s. The information desk is believed to have been there since the late 70s. The project kicked off on January 4th with the removal of the desk, wallpaper, merchandise displays, ceiling tiles and more.



Midway through the first week of work it became clear that this project would be a little more than expected. Mold had found its way into the walls in places and extensive damage had been done to the sheetrock in other places. So the next step of the project became replacing sheetrock and mudding walls.

Once the sheetrock had been replaced it was time to start prepping the walls for texture and paint. Many hours were spent filling holes, mudding and sanding walls. Once the walls were finally ready, it was time to start texturing and prepping to paint.





The texture went on quickly as did the primer, unfortunately then we had to wait for paint to dry. While the paint was drying, projects like sanding heater vents and wood trim, wiring new lights, planning new layouts, and more passed the time. Once the four new colors of painted were finally complete the rejuvenating began as we installed all our new and






updated elements. The lightening was updated, several new interpretive elements were installed, ceiling tiles were replaced and finally the big finale was the installation of a brand new information and retail desk.



TRNHA was honored to be a part of this amazing remodel and to assist with providing park visitors with an amazing place to begin their experience in Theodore Roosevelt National Park. TRNHA funds spent on this project exceeded \$150,000 and included the design and purchase of an educational display, information and retail desk, sound system, slatwall, and many miscellaneous items used for this project. Fire in the Badlands

April first proved to be more than just a fool's day in western North Dakota, it was also the day that kicked off a series of fires in the area of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. A very mild winter combined with extreme winds led to extreme fire conditions.

On Thursday, April 1st a power line started a fire south of Medora, which lead to a complete evacuation as the strong winds blew the flames towards the little tourist town. Firefighters worked hard and were able to protect all structures in the path and the fire was declared 100% contained by Monday morning.

Once fire crews had the Medora Fire under control National Park and Forest Service firefighters found themselves

headed to another fire. On Saturday, April 3, a fire started in McKenzie County just outside the North Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. High winds quickly pushed this fire into the National Park leading to a closure and evacuation on the North Unit. Fire crews worked quickly to try and get the fire in the rugged badlands under control by back burning over 2000 acres in order to protect structures in the area. Maintenance Crews from Theodore Roosevelt National Park have been dispatched to replace over 5 miles of fence that has burnt in an effort to keep the bison corralled in the park.

Yesterday the US Forest Service released the following statement: "As of 9:30 AM MDT today, firefighters are reporting 45% containment and an estimated 5000 acres burned for the Horse Pasture Fire in the North Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park (TRNP) and the McKenzie District of the Little Missouri National Grassland. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. Light winds last night and expected today have responders optimistic as they continue to contain the wildland fire. At this time, no structure damage has been reported, but the CCC campground and other infrastructure in the park are still at risk, as well as some private residences on the north end of the fire.

The USDA Forest Service has expanded the closure for the area affected by the Continued on page 2

Horse pasture wildfire south of Watford City. This Closure now includes CCC Campground, the Maah Daah Hey Trail from CCC Campground South to National Forest System Road (NFSR) 823, the Long X and Sunset Trail, Summit Campground, and the Summit Overlook. The closure applies to all National Forest System lands including roads and trails, in the area from the North Boundary of Theodore Roosevelt National Park North Unit, West of Highway 85, continuing West until NFSR 851 and South of 17th Street Northwest. This order is to protect public health and safety, and is in effect until further notice."

General Outdoor Activity Guidelines During Dry Conditions

General Public

- Restrict burning to early morning and late evening hours when typically winds are lower and humidity is higher.
- Restrict smoking to areas free of combustible materials. Use ashtrays and proper disposal containers.
- Clear area around fire.
- Pay attention to fire hazards posed by exhaust systems, catalytic converters, and safety chains.
- Carry fire extinguishers and fire tools.
- Extinguish and discard smoking materials appropriately NOT FROM VEHICLE.

Industry and Business

- <u>Farming</u>: Conduct frequent inspections of farm machinery to reduce debris accumulation. Grease and maintain equipment to reduce hot spots. Consider working fields in morning and evening when winds are down and humidity is up.
- Petroleum Industry: Confine blasting for seismic exploration by 10 feet or more of soil. Inspect and properly maintain equipment. Ensure flaring pads are free from debris that may start on fire and blow off the pad.
- Welding: Use spark arresters as recommended and keep a 10-foot radius surrounding a welding site cleared of combustible material.
- Railroads: Conduct weekly inspection of exhaust arrester systems and brakes.

The 67th Annual Spring Birdwalk in Theodore Roosevelt National Park will be held in the park's South Unit on Sunday, June 6. Participants should bring binoculars, field guides, and keen eyes to help record the day's sightings.

The leisurely one-hour stroll begins at 6:30 a.m. MDT and is for novice and experienced birders alike. Participants should meet at the Cottonwood Campground registration area. Each year, 40-50 species are observed during this popular outing and during the last 20 years over 80 different species have been sighted.

However, following the walk, at approximately 8:00 a.m., the Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association will provide a breakfast to-go to all participants. Fire Restrictions in TRNP

By order of the Superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Park and under the authority of Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations, Section 1.5(a), Section 1.5(a)(1), Section 2.13(c), and Section 2.2(a):

Due to ongoing extreme drought conditions in western North Dakota and elevated levels of fire danger the following public use limits and restrictions shall be implemented immediately:

- All areas of Theodore Roosevelt National Park to include the North Unit, Elkhorn Unit, and South Unit
 are closed to the lighting and maintaining of wood or charcoal fires. Self-contained gas or propane
 fires are still allowed in campgrounds, picnic areas, and backcountry areas where combustible materials are not present.
- Smoking is restricted to within enclosed vehicles traveling or stopped upon paved or gravel sections of roadway or parking lots.

The discharge of firearms within Theodore Roosevelt National Park and the possession or discharge of fireworks is also illegal.

Cooperation with this temporary public use limit is greatly appreciated. This order will be continually evaluated as conditions change.

This designation will remain in place until rescinded.





Trail Closures in TRNP

By order of the Superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Park and under the authority of Title 36, Code of Federal Regulations, Section 1.5(a) and Section 1.5(a)(1):


Effective immediately until rescinded the Jones Creek Trail in the South Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park is closed to all visitor use. The Lower Jones Creek Trailhead and parking area are also closed. This closure is necessary to support ongoing fire suppression activities.

The closure area will be monitored to ensure compliance. Cooperation with this temporary closure order is appreciated.

This designation will remain in place until rescinded.

Be a Prepared Hiker

As summer arrives many of us are eager to get out and explore nature, visiting a National Park is on many peoples summer trip list. They are excited to explore every inch of the beautiful land that has been set aside to protected and enjoyed. However, what they aren't planning for is a getting lost or taking a trip to the emergency room. And because we want your trip to North Dakota to be full of positive memories we thought we would share a few hiking tips.

Plan for wildlife encounters!

All animals in the park are wild and unpredictable. View them from a safe distance. Bison and other large mammals inhabit the park. They generally appear tranquil, but may attack without warning if they are disturbed. If you come upon a large mammal on the trail give them their space. Remember in Theodore Roosevelt National Park you do not have to stay on the trail so keep your distance and walk around them. It's their home and they have the right away! If they change their behavior they are aware of your presents and uncomfortable give them their space.

Rattlesnakes are present in the park. They do not always give a warning before striking. Be alert while walking, and do not put your hands or feet in a place you cannot see. Rattlesnakes and black widow spiders often live in prairie dog burrows.

Beware of the Weather!

Weather can be a large factor in your visit to Theodore Roosevelt National Park as a storm can roll into or form in the badlands quickly. Check the weather before going out and monitor for changing conditions.

Also the badlands are known for their dry heat which often catches people by surprise. Be sure to carry plenty of water, wear your hat, put on sunscreen, and take breaks in shady areas.

Reminder—Always let someone know where you are going!

Camping in Theodore Roosevelt National Park

The park has two campgrounds (both have one group site and many standard sites) and one group site for camping with horses. All campgrounds are primitive (no hookups, no showers).

Cottonwood Campground lies inside the park, about 5 miles from Medora, ND. It is the South Unit's only campground. Most sites are suitable for tents and RVs (no hookups). Cottonwood Campground fills to capacity each afternoon, mid-May through mid-September.

Juniper Campground is 5 miles from Hwy 85 and is the only campground in the park's North Unit. All sites are open to tent camping and most can also be used by vehicles/RVs (no hookups). Juniper Campground is trending to fill to capacity by late afternoon and definitely fills to capacity on holiday weekends.



Backcountry Permits

Anyone planning to camp overnight in the backcountry obtain a free backcountry permit. There are no established backcountry campsites. Camping in the backcountry is limited to 14 consecutive days.

For the South Unit and the Elkhorn Ranch Unit, backcountry permits can be obtained at the South Unit Visitor Center in Medora. Permits are not issued at the Painted Canyon Visitor Center.

For the North Unit, permits can be obtained at the North Unit Visitor Center. When you have completed your backcountry trip, please stop by the visitor center to advise rangers of your safe return, if possible.

Before obtaining a backcountry permit, some helpful information on hand that will make the process faster: Planned itinerary (how many in group, how many nights, entry/exit points, and route) – check out the park map on the icon in the banner if unfamiliar with the park.

Vehicle information (make, model, year, and license plate).

Emergency contact (name and number).

Safety Messages

It is highly suggested to carry a map with you in the backcountry. If you are in need of purchasing a topographic map of the park, contact our cooperating association, Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association (TRNHA). TRNHA is currently selling them via phone (701)623-4884 or via website https://www.shoptrnha.org. They can either do mail or curbside pickup; whatever is easiest for you.

Trail Alerts

As you plan your summer visit to Theodore Roosevelt National Park or Knife River Indian Villages, here are some new and ongoing trail closures to keep in mind:

Theodore Roosevelt National Park, North Unit -

Starting July 6th, the Caprock Coulee Trailhead and Parking Lot will be closed while maintenance personnel work on a construction project in the Caprock Coulee Parking Area. This closure is in effect until mid-September.

Knife River Indian Villages -

The river bank section of trail near the Sakakawea Village is closed due to ongoing erosion until further notice. The village site itself remains accessible by hiking from the visitor center.



TRNP Campground

Are you planning to visit Theodore Roosevelt National Park? The park is accepting reservations for Cottonwood Campground in the South Unit. Odd number sites can be reserved beginning June 28th, even number sites will remain first come first serve.










Fee Free Day Coming Soon!

Night Time in Dakota



Birding, hiking, wildlife watching - if you needed another reason to plan your trip to Theodore Roosevelt National Park, consider the night sky. Even in hazy weather, air quality and low light pollution make TRNP a great place to enjoy the night sky. "Theodore Roosevelt National Park is a great place to view the night sky, but, like other areas, there are threats to its relative darkness. Light pollution is visible in some areas. Nearby towns produce light that limit the number of stars that can be seen. The farther you get from these sources of light pollution, the more astronomical features you will be able to see. " (www.nps.gov/thro/index.htm).



Campground Schedule

The Cottonwood Campground in the South Unit and the Juniper Campground in the North Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park will officially switch to winter rates (with no running water available) on Oct. 1. Winter rates are \$7 per site per night (\$3.50 with Senior or Access Pass).

Fall Fauna: Porcupines

- The North American porcupine is considered the second largest rodent in North America.
- Breeding season is in the late fall/early winter.
- Baby porcupines are called porcupettes.
- The Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara used porcupine quills to decorate clothing. Examples of quillwork are part of the collection at Knife River Indian Villages.

Wendy Hart Ross Named as National Park Service Deputy Regional Director for Management and Administration, Department of Interior Regions 3,4,5

Regional Director Bert Frost, today announced the appointment of Wendy Hart Ross as Deputy Regional Director for Management and Administration of Interior Regions 3,4,5, in America's Midwest. She will move into the Deputy position at the end of November after having served the past seven years as Superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Park.

"Wendy is an outstanding leader with broad experience gained through serving in a variety of National Park Service positions," **Frost said.** "I look forward to working with

her in this new capacity. Wendy has a proven track record of problem solving, and a comprehensive understanding of park operations and regional programs that will serve her well in her new position."

"I look forward to expanding my current role to support the incredible staff, superior programs, and unique parks that make this region unparalleled in the National Park Service," **Ross said.** "It is a privilege to continue serving the public and the parks in this way."

In her new role, Ross will be part of the senior leadership team overseeing 58 national park units, 3 national trails, and 8 national heritage areas located in 13 states. The region employs approximately 2300 people and almost 39,000 volunteers, and averages nearly 23 million visitors who contribute approximately \$1.6 billion to local economies annually.

Ross is second generation in the National Park Service following in the footsteps of her father who also served as superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. She has spent her 29-year government career in parks throughout the country where she served in a variety of management positions, including Management Assistant at Glacier National Park and Superintendent at Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site. She began her National Park Service career in Yellowstone National Park as a Visitor Use Assistant and later served as Resource Management Specialist at Shiloh National Military Park and North Cascades National Park Complex. Ross was an agricultural community development worker as a US Peace Corps Volunteer in Sri Lanka before joining the National Park Service.

Theodore Roosevelt National Park is preparing a long-range comprehensive site plan for all developed areas of the park including: Painted Canyon Overlook, South Unit Entrance at Medora, North Unit Entrance, Peaceful Valley Ranch, and the Elkhorn Ranch Unit. For those interested in learning more about the park and the planning process, the National Park Service will host two meetings the first week of November. The meetings will present the same information.

National Park Service representatives will present long-range planning concepts that will address future facility needs, prioritize infrastructure investments, and leverage partnership opportunities. Participants will have the opportunity to shape the future of Theodore Roosevelt National Park and define a new era celebrating Theodore Roosevelt's conservation ethic.

Calling All Birder's

Cache Pit Maize

In early Spring of this year, a visitor reached out to us at Knife River Indian Villages asking for information about an accession record from a seed bank. That record reads as follows:

"Seed given to Dr. Henry Shands by Hans Walker who received the seed from Myra Snow. According to Ms. Snow the seed was unearthed from one of the food caches down in the old village of Stanton N.D. the old village of Stanton was abandoned by Mandan Indians in 1837 because of smallpox. The Mandan Tribe lived along the upper Missouri river from approx. 1700 - 1800."

After reading this record, the first thing that jumped out to me was the "cache pit." And, if the record is true about Stanton, it would have to be the Hidatsa village of Amahami (located on the very North end of town). This village fell victim to a Lakota attack in 1834, so any abandoned cache material would be from this time period.

Additionally, there was an archaeological excavation that took place there in 1971 and the original seed keeper, Myra Snow, was around in the area. She assisted in special events at KNRI in the 1980s. But other conclusive evidence has yet to be found.

Still, I was intrigued by the inquiry and record. I tracked down the seed bank - the North Central Regional Plant Introduction Station located on the Iowa State University campus in Ames, Iowa. They obtained the seed in 1993. Using the U.S. National Plant Germplasm system, I acquired our own sample to grow here at the park.

It grew well in my home garden this year and the plans are to bring it "home" to the garden at KNRI in the Spring of 2022!


