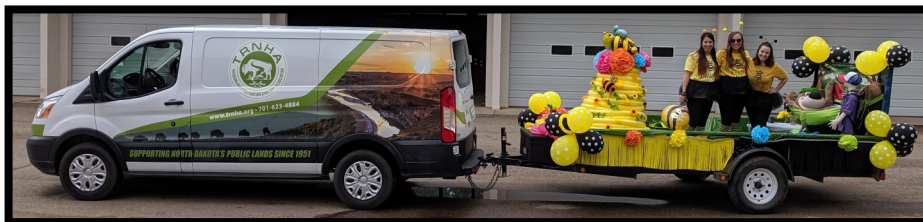

Winter Winds

Winter is a difficult time for many creatures on the northern great plains, but can make for hours of excellent, silent, wildlife watching. One unique creature that you may encounter on a winter visit to Theodore Roosevelt National Park is the Pronghorn (*Antilocapra Americana*). Theodore Roosevelt explained how pronghorn deal with the cold and snow of winter in the northern great plains in *The Wilderness Hunter*.

...the prong-horn must also fear the elements, and especially the snows of winter. On the northern plains the cold weather is of polar severity, and turns the green, grassy prairies of mid-summer into ironbound wastes. The blizzards whirl and sweep across them with a shrieking fury which few living things may face. ...Accordingly, as the bright fall weather passes, and the dreary winter draws night,.. The antelope gather in bands and seek sheltered places, where they may abide though the winter-time of famine and cold and deep snow.

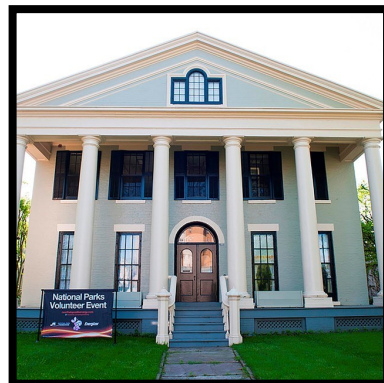
Presidents' Day

Over the year's the National Park Service has become a keeper of presidential histories through the conservation of sites associated with former presidents—including Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The NPS has created a webpage that highlights and links to 28 National Park Sites dedicated to former presidents. This page demonstrates just how prominent the story of Theodore Roosevelt is in the story of modern America...the National Park Sites seem to chronical Roosevelt's life and career.

This includes:

- Theodore Roosevelt Birthplace National Historic Site (*the childhood of a renowned president*)
- Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural National Historic Site (*an unexpected inauguration*)
- Sagamore Hill National Historic Site (*TR's summer White House*) (*right*)
- Theodore Roosevelt National Park (*in honor of a president*)

Winter Winds

It seems no matter where you are this winter, it's a good idea to be prepared for cold temperatures. If you are cold weather hiking, remember to dress in layers, wear a hat, add a liner to your sleeping bag. (The American Hiking Society even suggests using a foam sleeve/coozie to prevent your water bottle from freezing!) In case you were wondering how they dealt with these temperatures in TR's day—wonder no more. Roosevelt included a thorough description of his cold weather gear in *The Hunting Trips of a Ranchman*:

On very cold days, fur gloves and either a coonskin overcoat or a short riding-jacket of fisher's fur may be worn. In cold weather, if travelling light with only what can be packed behind the horse, I sleep in a big buffalo-robe, sewed up at the sides and one end into the form of a bag, and very warm. When, as is sometimes the case, the spirit in the thermometer sinks to — 60°-65° Fahrenheit, it is necessary to have more wraps and bedding, and we use beaver-robos and bearskins.

Quiet on the Town

Although spring is scheduled to sneak up on us this month, there are probably a few cold winter days due for North Dakota. If you head out into Theodore Roosevelt National Park on one of those cold days, you may come upon a prairie dog town and wonder “Where did the prairie dogs go?” It’s a common question, often followed by the thought *Do prairie dogs hibernate?*

Before you run into the visitor center with this frequently asked question, we’ve done some investigating and here’s what we found:

Prairie dogs do not go into true hibernation, but periods of dormancy or "torpor" during the coldest periods of the winter. Their activity and appetite are decreased during winter. They may sleep for many days at a time, but the town is usually active during the milder days of winter.

Jesse Kolar

Jesse grew up and resides in Dickinson. He has been the proud owner of many annual passes to Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Jesse has worked on research projects studying pronghorn and mule deer in the area and is currently working as an upland game biologist for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department. He has a wildlife management background and is fairly fluent with the natural history in western North Dakota and the badlands.

He has volunteered for various group organizations including church organizations, Roughrider Archer's, Hunter's Education, Prairie's and Potholes Birding Festival, The Wildlife Society, Mule Deer Foundation, Peace Corps, and others. Jesse describes himself as an open-minded person who can work cooperatively with a wide range of people to help promote activities at TRNP. In addition, his roles working for state agencies have given him experience reviewing budgets and spreadsheets.

Jesse has previously been very active in TRNHA activities including the annual plant walk and helping as a bird guide at the annual bird walk. Jesse says, "I consider myself lucky to be able to visit the park regularly to watch and photograph wildlife and meet diverse folks from across the world who visit the park."

Work in North Dakota for the National Parks

Seasonal Maintenance Worker (WG 7)

The primary purpose of the position is to perform recurring building and/or utility maintenance and operation duties and to assist journeymen and other higher graded maintenance workers. Incumbent utilizes knowledge and skills in several trades and crafts. All of the duties described by this position may not exist in each location, but that should not preclude use of this position.

Seasonal Maintenance Worker (WG 5)

Performs simple and routine work involved in the maintenance and repair of grounds, exterior structures, buildings and related utilities, requiring the use of a variety of trade practices associated with occupations such as carpentry, masonry, plumbing, electrical, cement work, painting, and other related trades.

Seasonal Laborer (Motor Vehicle Operating) (WG 4)

The primary purpose of the position is to perform laboring duties that require moderately heavy physical effort requiring the use of common hand tools and power equipment involving any or all of the following duties. In order to accomplish the laborer duties the incumbent must on a regular and recurring basis also operate light duty motor vehicles weighing up to 10,000 pounds to transport personnel, material, or equipment to work sites located on the park.

A 23-year veteran of the NPS, Richman has worked in a variety of national parks throughout the Western U.S. She currently serves as Director of Interpretation, Education, and Visitor Services for Arches and Canyonlands national parks in Utah. She will assume her new role on May 22, 2022.

Richman has served in leadership roles in multiple national parks, a regional office and in the NPS Natural Resource Stewardship and Science program headquartered in Fort Collins, CO. She has held the Master Interpreter title in the NPS and has lead communications for the NPS Climate Change Response Program. Her park experience spans ten parks from Sitka, Alaska to multiple parks in Utah, New Mexico and Colorado including Chaco Culture and Pecos national historical parks, Bryce Canyon National Park, Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park and Curecanti National Recreation Area.

Richman earned a bachelor's degree in astrophysics with a minor in archaeology from the University of New Mexico, with an emphasis on cultural astronomy, specifically the study of how past cultures used the celestial objects in the sky in their daily lives. She will relocate to the Medora, North Dakota area with her pets. She looks forward to exploring the park in all seasons, attending the Medora musical and enjoying the amazing dark night skies of southwest North Dakota.

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2022 Photo Contest

Spring into Adventure

With the onset of April and springtime in North Dakota, many people are starting to gear up for their summer adventures. There is no better way to celebrate springtime than with an adventure into Theodore Roosevelt National Park (TRNP). Springs often means cooler temperature, less visitation, and some ideal wildlife viewing. Consider your next adventure into TRNP with a hike or a horseback ride into the South Unit's *Petrified Forest* area.

There are a number of access points for the petrified forest which lies within the Wilderness area of the park.

Depending on the access point and the route chosen, roundtrip trail distances can vary from 3 miles to 14 miles. This trail is completed by many as both a day hike or as an overnight in the backcountry.

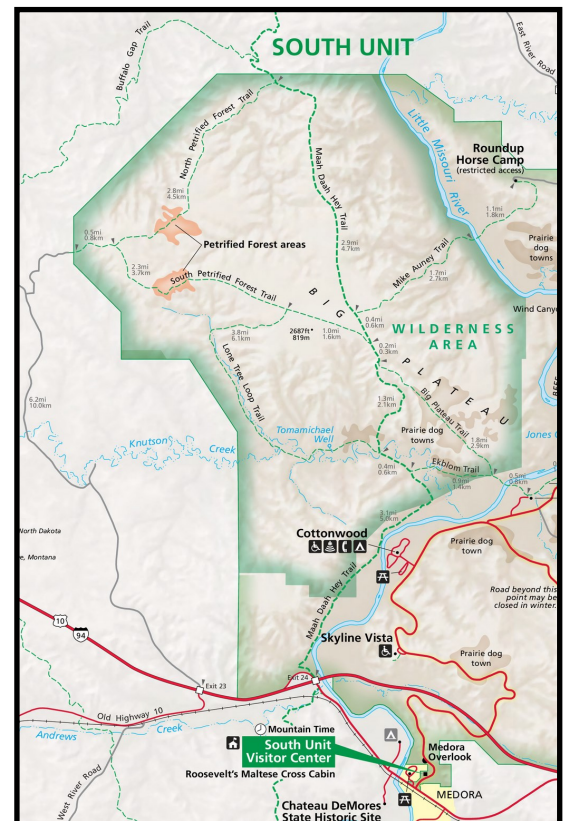
Any stay overnight in the park's backcountry requires a free permit issued by the South Unit Visitor Center.

While these are beautiful and scenic places, remember:

- Stop by or call (701-623-4466) the South Unit Visitor Center in Medora for current conditions.
- Dress for the weather
- Don't approach wildlife
- Bring plenty of drinking water
- If hiking alone, make sure someone else knows your plans
- Always have a map and understand how to use it

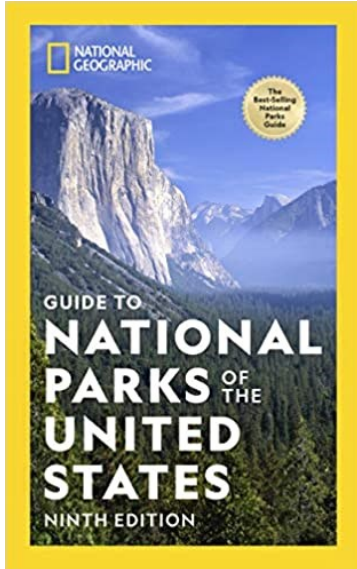

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TRNHA's 68th Annual Birdwalk



We are one month away from the TRNHA 68th Annual Birdwalk. This year's birdwalk will be held in the South Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park on Sunday, June 5. Participants should bring binoculars, field guides, and keen eyes to help record the day's sightings.

Each year 40-50 bird species are observed during this popular annual outing. Novice and experienced birders are invited to join this leisurely one-hour stroll beginning at 6:30 am MDT. Participants will meet at the Cottonwood Campground registration area.

Following the walk, at approximately 8:00 am, the Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association will provide breakfast to-go. Those interested in receiving breakfast are encouraged to RSVP (to ensure that there are enough breakfasts prepared for everyone).

After the birdwalk, Association staff will compile a full list of bird species sighted during this event. The list will be emailed out to registered participants. Spring Into Adventure

Consider your May hike into Theodore Roosevelt National Park - The Painted Canyon Trail. This popular out and back hike begins on the east side of the parking area at the Painted Canyon Visitor Center. Follow the footpath along the rim of the canyon before slowly descending the colorful buttes, and into the sagebrush flats. The Painted Canyon Trail ends at the intersection with the Upper Paddock Creek Trail, most hikers will stop their day hike here and return the path they followed back to the visitor center. Visitors along the trail can expect wonderful badlands vistas, greening vegetation, and possibly newly birthed bison babies.

Painted Canyon Trail

Distance: 2.1 Miles (One Way)

Difficulty: Moderate

Always remember when taking on any trail:

- Stop by or call (701-623-4466) the South Unit Visitor Center in Medora for current conditions
- Dress for the weather
- Don't approach wildlife
- Bring plenty of drinking water
- If hiking alone, make sure someone else knows your plans
- Always have a map and understand how to use it

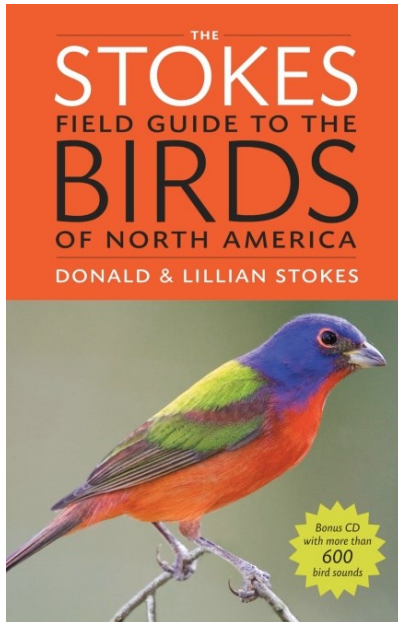

Theodore Roosevelt National Park - South Unit & North Unit

Be prepared for temporary closures and pilot cars throughout the park for chip seal road improvements.

The scenic loop in the South Unit will remain closed to vehicle, bike, and foot traffic between miles 24-28 due to continuous erosion.

Knife River Indian Village NHS

Though the village sites remains accessible to hikers, the river bank portion of trail near Sakakawea Village remains closed due to erosion.

Thank you for your patience and cooperation while the parks undergo continuous maintenance, here are a few tips to help you and your friends plan a great summer adventure -

- ◆ Stop by the Visitor Center for current road, weather, and trail conditions and, where available, view the park film.

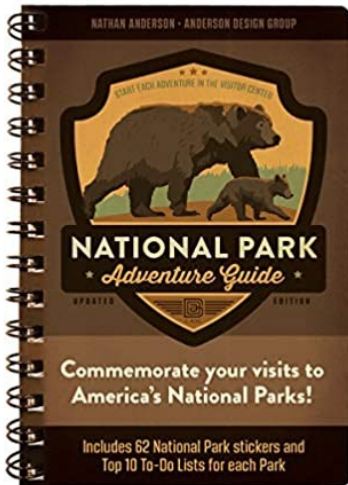

American Goldfinches can be found all across the United States. However, the goldfinch's breeding grounds span the top of the United States and into Canada, including North Dakota. The males are hard to miss because of their brilliant yellow plumage. They can often be found out in the open or in shrub-like areas heavy in thistle. Although they may eat insects on occasion, American Goldfinches eat mostly seeds. Their diet is almost entirely vegetarian— thriving on seeds of plants like sunflower.

Throughout June the thickets and groves about the ranch house are loud with bird music from before dawn till long after sunrise.

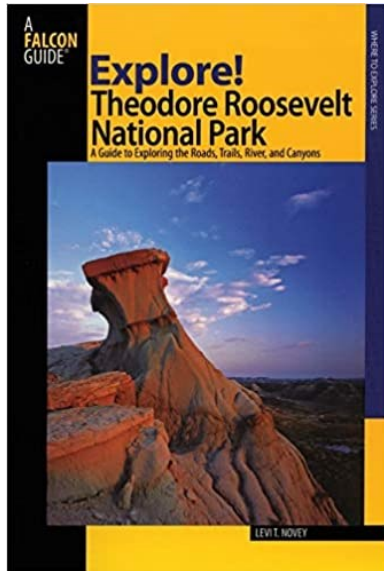
July 4th 3:00pm

Stopping to Smell the Wildflowers

As we say “see you later” to some of our summer seasonal employees, we are pleased to feature the unique experience and writing talent of our invaluable summer visitor service clerk, Nolan. We wish him the best in his next journey and hope his experience may inspire you to create your own memories on our team next season!

Whenever I travel, I sometimes have a difficult time going off the beaten path. I am a planner by heart, just ask my parents. I once spent the better part of a summer planning a trip to Disney World only to fail in the final pitch to my mother and her partner at the time. As I have gotten older, I have tried harder and harder to break this mindset; instead of planning trips to completion, I have instead begun the practice of going where the wind takes me, especially when exploring new areas. Granted, I am *always* going to check ahead of time to make sure I don't miss any historical sites and things of that nature. But, no longer feeling as though I need to know what I am going to eat every day, or what I am going to partake in activity wise, has helped me explore more in the long run. After being plagued for so long by the idea that I would miss out if I did *not* plan ahead of time, I have realized that the real adventures have come from the lack of forethought.

That being said, I have been blessed with the opportunity to spend this summer in Medora, North Dakota. This town of about 142 people serves as the gateway to Theodore Roosevelt National Park (THRO). So, while the permanent residences may be few, the hotel rooms and campsites are often crawling with weekend warriors, nomads, and full-on-families. Outside of working for the Theodore Roosevelt Nature & History Association (TRNHA), I have had ample time to explore the park and the wonders of the small town. Pretty soon into my time in Medora this summer, I got enthralled by the sheer amount of history here.

From my own studies, I knew that Theodore Roosevelt hunted and ranched in the area, but I was not fully aware of all the other rich stories that flood the region. Take for example, the Marquis de Mores, an entrepreneurial Frenchman and key player in the North Dakota badlands in the 1880s. His claim to fame was the founding of a meatpacking industry in the Northern Great Plains that sent freshly slaughtered beef to the East Coast for sale. He also founded Medora in the spring of 1883, the same year Theodore Roosevelt made his way to the badlands for a hunting trip. The two men, who both had extraordinarily large personalities, occasionally clashed. This eventually led to the Marquis challenging Roosevelt to a duel. Roosevelt responded coolly, by saying, “Most emphatically I am not your enemy; if I were you would know it, for I would be an open one, and would not have asked you to my house nor gone to yours.” This only leads you to think where we might be as a society today if we were to respond to challenges in the same way—head on and brief and nature.

I currently study history at Waldorf University in Forest City, Iowa. My own particular interests are in environmental/conservation history, so moving to "the Cradle of Conservation" (as historian Lowell E. Baier would put it) for the summer was not a hard choice to make. Even though he did not found the National Park Service, or even establish the first national park, Theodore Roosevelt still goes down in history as the great conservationist president who set aside over 230 million acres of public lands during his presidency. He also created the United States Forest Service and established the first Federal Bird Reserve, making him popular amongst modern-day tree-huggers and birders alike.

But, alongside all the history comes potentially my favorite part of the summer. With a background in acting and history, I was overjoyed to be given the opportunity to break the rust off my acting chops and hit the stage this summer. Before you ask, I was *not* the newest addition to the Burning Hills Singers, or any other members of the Medora Musical. Instead, was Theodore Roosevelt himself. Thanks to the great people here in Medora, I was able to not only walk around town as that "Cowboy Dude" and "Cyclone Assemblyman" – as he was known in his younger days – but also to hit the stage and perform for the annual Badlands Chautauqua: Gathering of the Theodore Roosevelts. This involved a mix of telling stories in the first-person, getting younger folks excited about history, and rubbing elbows with some of the best Theodore Roosevelt reprisers known. All-in-all, it was a great time, and a fantastic way to show off all the history I had learned out here in the Badlands of North Dakota.

At the beginning of the summer, the notion of leaving Iowa to head for western North Dakota was a bit frightening to me. As mentioned earlier, I tried my best to not over plan for the summer excursion. I knew that thanks to the wonderful people at the Theodore Roosevelt & History Association, I would have a reliable job and bed to sleep on. The rest I was leaving to fall into place. Doing it this way gave me the opportunity to meet all the amazing people I did this summer, and allowed me to do fun things like dress up as a young Theodore Roosevelt and have impromptu trips with my fellow coworkers. The lack of an absolute plan gave me enough free time to wander and find my own path, much like Theodore Roosevelts and others did when making their way out to Medora. But, most of all, it allowed me to build lasting relationships that I know I will cherish for many years to come.

There really might be some magic in these burning hills. Allow yourself enough time to stop and smell the wildflowers, and you just might find it yourself.

Happy Birthday National Park Service! On August 25, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson signed the Organic Act, creating the National Park Service. Founders Day is celebrated each year on August 25 in all of America's national parks to honor the creation of the agency.

- Today there are 423 units within the National Park System.
- 63 are designated as *National Parks*.
- Yellowstone National Park (WY) was the first national park established in 1872.
- New River Gorge (WV) is the most recent national park, designated as such in 2020.
- There are six national park sites that tell the story of Theodore Roosevelt, the “conservation president.”
- Today there are three National Park Service sites in North Dakota: Theodore Roosevelt National Park, Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site, and Fort Union National Historic Site.

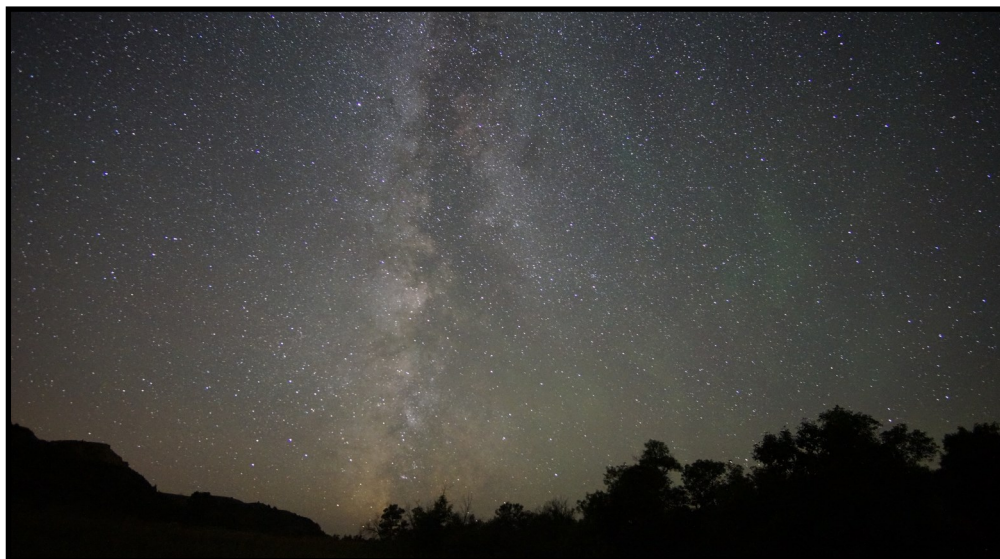




Astronomy Festival

Our Picks for Autumn Pics



Our first pick for Autumn pics is the Coal Vein Nature Trail located in the South Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. This .6 to .8 mile loop highlights some of the best geological features of the park as well as the flora and fauna that make fall fantastic in the badlands. Although the trail is alive during the spring and summer, in the fall it becomes a place to explore between juniper-treed slopes. Keep an eye out for the occasional bright orange aspen.

On the ground, this time of year highlights the late summer and autumn flowering plants including sunflowers and rubber rabbit brush. If your adventures take you out at dawn or dusk, listen for the bugle of elk in rut. Elk frequent the wooded areas of the park

and become more active during this time of year. Check out the Coal Vein Nature Trail guide before you hit the trail at <https://www.nps.gov/thro/planyourvisit/upload/Coal-Vein-508.pdf>.

What We're All About

This past month, TRNHA has been a proud supporter of some huge events hosted by our partner sites. We want to take a minute to celebrate these successes, specifically the Dakota Nights Astronomy Festival at Theodore Roosevelt National Park and the "Lifeways" cultural event at Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site.

The Dakota Nights Astronomy Festival featured activities, guest speakers, and night sky viewings. Our Keynote speakers brought in nearly 250 visitors who packed our campground amphitheater and our telescope viewing stations attracted over 350 night sky viewers.



For the first time since 2019, the "Lifeways" event hosted hundreds of fourth graders at Knife River Indian Villages NHS. Students learned about trading, Native American winter counts, sign language, and the Hidatsa ways of life including earth lodges and historic hunting.

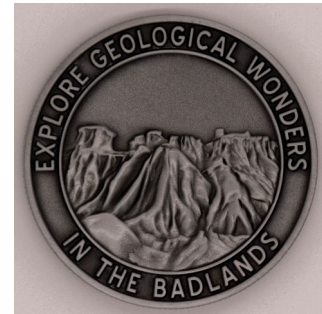

Our Picks for Autumn Pics

Our November pick is one of many beautiful places in the North Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park—a view from the South Achenbach Trail.

A dry fall day is the perfect weather for a drive along the scenic road or getting out and about on a park trail. Hikers can wander among the cottonwoods in the Juniper Campground, explore the Caprock Coulee, or get off the beaten path on the South Achenbach Trail (pictured). The South Achenbach Trail features an abundance of trees that hit just right with fall colors while highlighting the river, hills, and nearby buttes.

Elk in Theodore Roosevelt National Park

History of Elk in North Dakota - Elk (*cervus elaphus*) once thrived across the plains and mountains of North America. Common in the Dakota Badlands, elk were a staple game food for early civilizations. When Theodore Roosevelt arrived to the Badlands in the 1880s, few elk were left in this area of the country.

Although Roosevelt named his Elkhorn Ranch after the interlocking antlers found at the site, living animals were hard to find. "This stately and splendid deer, the lordliest of its kind... is now fast vanishing," he wrote in the 1880s. By the end of the century, elk were no longer found in the Badlands.

In an effort to reestablish the native ecology, Theodore Roosevelt National Park reintroduced elk to the South Unit in 1985. The original animals were transferred from Wind Cave National Park in South Dakota. Since that time, the park has monitored and managed the elk population within the park boundary.

Elk Management Program - Without natural predators in the ecosystem, it was expected that elk would overpopulate the park. A management program was designed with the following goals:

- Research elk movement and distribution
- Manage population dynamics
- Monitor consumption rates

Elk Movement and Distribution - The park uses Global Position Systems (GPS) mounted on wildlife collars to track elk. Generally, female elk are targeted for collaring. Measurements are taken throughout the day and night to provide a distributive sampling. The park's elk population moves in and out of the park boundary. Studies provide data on the movement of elk around the region. Collared elk are also used to assist with location of herds. These devices help wildlife biologists not only research elk movement, but manage their population dynamics as well.

Elk Population Dynamics - After the 1985 reintroduction, the park set an optimal population of 100-400 animals. Within a few years, that number had been exceeded.

To reduce the increasing elk population within the park, roundups of live elk were conducted in 1993 and 2000. Helicopters were used to direct animals to a handling facility within the park. Elk were transferred to American Indian tribes and sites for elk reintroduction programs

After 2000, outbreaks of chronic wasting disease restricted the



Pack horses were used to transport elk meat to a park facility. In addition to the donations, volunteers in the reduction were allowed to take home the meat from one animal.

transportation of elk. Within ten years, the park's elk population exploded to over 1000 animals. In 2010, the park implemented a direct reduction of the elk herd.

Park staff, with assistance from local volunteers, target elk for removal based on age and sex. Meat from reductions is given to Native American tribes in North Dakota, as well as the organization Sportsmen Against Hunger. Elk reductions occur based on current population dynamics. A primary goal of managing the elk population is to maintain adequate forage for the several large herbivore populations in the park.

Elk Consumption Studies - Several large herbivorous species thrive in the South Unit of the park, including elk, bison, mule deer and feral horses. Wildlife managers developed a model of forage resources for these species in 1993. A second study was completed in 2003. By identifying the overlap in consumption rates between animals, the park can maintain a healthy ecosystem. Proper forage and vegetative cover are necessary for the health of all wildlife.

Future of Elk Management - The national park works with North Dakota Game & Fish Department to manage the elk population in southwestern North Dakota. Annual elk reductions within the park have proven successful at maintaining the park's optimum population of 100-400 animals. This management is necessary to ensure a healthy ecosystem.

As a part of the natural ecosystem, elk belong in North Dakota. Due to the absence of natural predators within that ecosystem, agencies like the National Park Service have a responsibility to manage these animals. Reintroduction of elk to Theodore Roosevelt National Park has helped the park achieve the goals of conserving wildlife and providing recreation for visitors and residents of North Dakota.

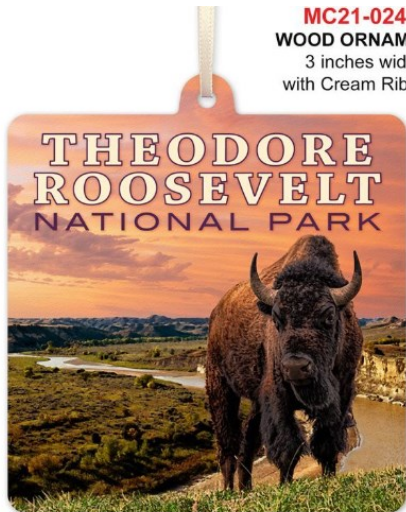

Spotting Elk - Visitors to the South Unit have an opportunity to see elk; although they have been sighted in the North Unit, elk are rare in that region. The animals can be challenging to spot, and the key factor is not *where* but *when*. Like most grazers, elk are commonly seen in or near prairie dog towns. The best time to look for them is at dawn and dusk as they usually remain hidden in wooded areas during much of the day.

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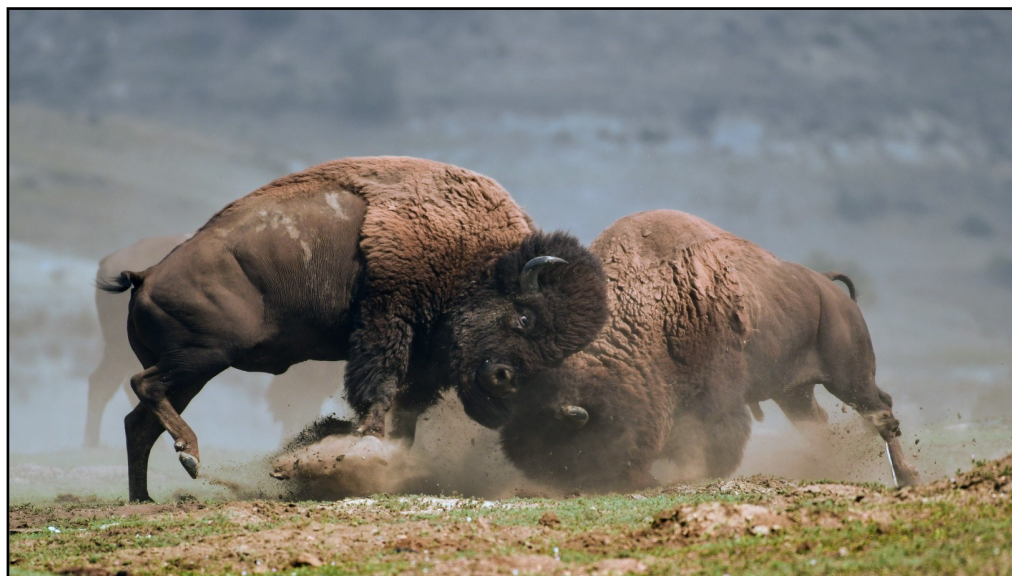
Annual Photo Contest

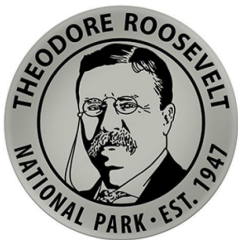
