RESOLUTIONS FOR A GREENER NEW YEAR

The National Park Service epitomizes Americas natural, cultural, and historical values throughout the country. It is tasked with protecting, interpreting, and maintaining 408 sites that attracted 273.6 million visitors in 2013. With such a monumental task for park staff, it's up to park visitors to ensure they do their part in sustaining our park resources for the future. Listed below are just a few ways that visitors can reduce their impact when recreating at National Park Service sites.

Reduce, Reuse and Recycle

Plan your trip accordingly, while disposable items are easy to travel with, consider reusable water bottles and dishware for your next picnic or camping trip. Also consider a reusable bag for your next purchase in a park bookstore. As always recycle approved materials in appropriate receptacles found throughout many park sites.





Limit Idling

National Parks are famous for their natural beauty and free roaming wildlife. To ensure others have the opportunity to enjoy these resources consider turning off your vehicle when enjoying an overlook or watching wildlife. This promotes natural soundscapes, clean air, and dark night skies.

Walk, Bike, or Take Public Transportation

Where available, consider alternative methods for transportation when visiting national parks. It can be as simple as using a park shuttle or deciding to walk or bike when going to your next trailhead or ranger program.



While these are a few ways to promote sustainability within our parks. The National Park Service and its partners will reach millions of visitors this year. When you or someone you know is one of those visitors, take the opportunity to practice resource stewardship within our public lands, consider ways to reduce your impact, and as always get out and enjoy your National Parks!

WINTER VIEWS

Wintertime is a spectacular time in the Little Missouri Badlands. Here is Theodore Roosevelt's perspective as written in <u>The Wilderness Hunter</u>:

Snow lay on the ground, leaving bare patches here and there, but drifted deep in the hollows. Under the steel-blue heavens the atmosphere had a peculiar glint as if filled with myriads of tiny crystals. As I crossed the frozen river, immediately in front of the ranch house, the strangely carved tops of the bluffs were reddening palely in the winter sunrise. Prairie fowl were perched in the bare cottonwoods along the river brink, showing large in the leafless branches; they called and clucked to one another.







FEE INCREASE EFFECTIVE FEBRUARY 1

Theodore Roosevelt National Park (TRNP) will implement an increase in campground and entrance fees effective February 1, 2015. In order to lessen the impact of the fee increase, the park will phase changes over three years.

Beginning February 1, visitors will pay \$20 for a 7-day pass for a single, non commercial vehicle entry or \$40 for an annual pass into TRNP. By 2017 a 7-day pass will cost \$25 and an annual pass \$50. Additionally rates at the Cottonwood and Juniper campgrounds will increase to \$14 per night and per site. The Interagency Pass rates will remain the same: Annual (\$80) and Senior (\$10).

The winner will be featured on the 2016 Theodore Roosevelt Annual Pass.



PRESIDENTIAL PARKS

Presidents Day is February 16. This day gives us the opportunity to celebrate the accomplishments of our U.S. Presidents. What better way to celebrate Presidents Day than by visiting a National Park site—like Theodore Roosevelt National Park—dedicated to one of our nations' leaders.

Today, the National Park Service cares for 408 sites in the United States and its territories. Sites under the administration of the NPS have many designations including National Park, National Monument, National Preserve, National Historic site, etc. Of the 408 units nearly 40 are dedicated to the history of the U.S. presidents. Theodore Roosevelt National Park is just one of the many park sites featuring our 26th president. Other sites, of various designations, include:

Theodore Roosevelt Birthplace National Historic Site Sagamore Hill National Historic Site Theodore Roosevelt Inaugural National Historic Site Theodore Roosevelt Island National Memorial Mount Rushmore National Memorial

WINTER VIEWS

Winter is a time of change across the prairie and, while it is often noted for cold and snow, the weather can sometimes be surprising. Here is Prince Maximilian's perspective while staying as a guest with the Mandan in 1834:

The change of weather was extremely remarkable. During the night the [look] of the whole area changed in a striking manner. Over half the snow was gone. The whole prairie and hills were only spotted with snow; large stretches were bare of [it]. Rarely have I experienced such a fast change. The ground does not become as wet as it does in Europe when snow melts rapidly, because the eternally blowing winds here dry up the dampness right away.







TRNP HORSE CONCESSION OWNERS RIDE INTO THE SUNSET

Shadow Country Outfitters offered its final trail rides in Theodore Roosevelt National Park on September 1, 2014. Shadow Country Outfitters have held the concession contract for guided horseback rides on park trails since 1997. The owners, Neil and Laura Tangen, decided to retire from the business at the end of the 2014 summer season.



The concession was operated out of the historic Peaceful Valley Ranch in the park's South Unit. "Shadow Country Outfitters offered a wonderful adventure for park visitors for many years," said Chief Ranger Dean Wyckoff. "The Tangens were passionate about providing a high quality trail riding experience and they will be missed. We wish them well."

Guided horseback rides are a tradition in many national parks. The rides began at Peaceful Valley Ranch in 1918 when the property was operated as a dude ranch and continued until the federal government purchased the ranch in 1936. Under federal ownership, the ranch housed Civilian Conservation Corps, Works Progress Administration, and Emergency Relief Administration staff during the Great Depression. The ranch served as headquarters when the park was established in 1947 until 1959, and was used as park housing until 1965. A horseback riding concession operated out of the ranch beginning in 1967. Peaceful Valley Ranch is on the National Register of Historic Places.

The park will soon begin several years of much needed repairs to the buildings, but does not have immediate plans to contract with another concessioner. Visitors may still experience the park on their own horses and trail rides are available in the town of Medora.







A FEATURE INTERVIEW WITH ARTIST, CHUCK BLACK

Wildlife enthusiast and artist, Chuck Black, has been hanging out around Theodore Roosevelt National Park for years doing exactly what he loves is working with wildlife and being inspired by the landscape and animals around North Dakota. You might recognize Black's work as a featured part of last year's 60th Annual TRNHA Birdwalk or from the 2013 Colorado Duck Stamp. Recently, we caught up with Chuck and asked him a few questions about his artwork:



How would you describe your artwork?

I would describe my artwork as the way I express my love and passion for wildlife and the outdoors. My style is typically realistic, but I oftentimes like to stretch the boundaries of realism and use my creativity to keep it fun and interesting. Much of my art in the past has been focused on the wildlife itself; however I'm trying to take a new direction with it. I want to capture the American outdoor traditions that many of us share and I think you'll see my artwork make some drastic changes in the near future.

How did you get started?

I'd say that I got started as an artist in elementary school. I have fond memories of always drawing in my notebooks and never paying attention in class. Throughout grade school it became more of an addiction to draw whenever I could. I think overtime I realized that I really loved what I was doing and began to approach it more seriously when I was in high school. I took advantage of any art class in school that I could take. Then through college I eventually began starting to dabble with paint and it didn't take long for it to take over as my favorite medium to work in.

What inspires you most?

The outdoors inspires me as an artist. I often tell people that I'm not passionate about art. I'm passionate about wildlife and art is just a way that I can express that. I've been an outdoor enthusiast all my life and I also have my degree in wildlife biology. I spend my 40 hour work week in the backcountry most of the time, and that's where my true inspiration comes from. I've loved realistic art most of my life, however I'm trying to move towards simply capturing the love of the outdoors in my work and not worrying about the realism as I create. I really just want outdoor lovers like myself to be able to relate their own experiences to my art. I think you'll see my artwork going through a lot of changes in the next couple years to come.

What is your favorite season in the badlands?

My favorite season in the badlands is undoubtedly the fall. For starters the weather is usually great for getting out to hike, but the wildlife this time of year is what I love most. Beginning with the bison rut in August, the elk in September, and the deer in October/November, the badlands just comes alive with wildlife activity. I love getting into the backcountry during that time of year as you can witness some amazing things at any given time of day. My most fond memories of being outdoors are the ones I have of being miles off trail on cool November days in the badlands; I'll never get tired of that.













APRIL SHOWERS...

Grassland biomes are divided according to their variations in temperature and precipitation. There are tropical grasslands and temperate grasslands. In our temperate grasslands, specifically mixed grass prairie, April is the beginning of the most significant months for precipitation. The precipitation we get affects the plants, animals, and, yes, even visitors. For temperate grasslands, the annual precipitation measures 10 to 30 inches (25 to 75 centimeters). Theodore Roosevelt National Park receives annual average precipitation of 15 inches each year.







61ST ANNUAL BIRDWALK AND CHUCK WAGON BREAKFAST

The 61st Annual Spring Birdwalk in Theodore Roosevelt National Park will be held in the park's South Unit on Sunday, June 7. The birdwalk is sponsored by the Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association, the park's non-profit partner. The Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association sells books and other interpretive materials in park visitor centers and donates the proceeds to the national park.



The leisurely one-hour stroll begins at 6:30 a.m. MDT and is for novice and experienced birders alike. Participants should meet at the

Cottonwood Campground registration area. Each year, 40-50 species are observed during this popular outing and during the last 20 years over 80 different species have been sighted.

Following the walk, at approximately 8:00 a.m., the Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association will host its annual Chuck Wagon Breakfast at the Cottonwood Campground Picnic Area. The menu includes buttermilk pancakes, country sausage, cowboy coffee and juice. We will be charging a small fee to help defray expenses of the meal. PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOP AT KNIFE RIVER INDIAN VILLAGES

BIRDING TIPS

Here are some beginner birding tips from National Parks across the country:

- **Research** Become familiar with the birds in your area, take a look on-line, in your field guide, and ask for a common birds checklist at your local visitor center (Over the course of the year, over 180 species of birds can be seen around the 3 units of Theodore Roosevelt National Park!)
- **Prepare** Bring binoculars, a good field guide, and a pen and notebook (to keep track of your birding observations)
- **Practice** Spot a bird with your eyes and bring binoculars up to your eyes without moving your head while keeping the bird in sight
- Bird While you are in the field, maintain your distance, keep quite & listen for bird calls

Know the Rules - Make sure you are not harassing wildlife or encroaching on the management of species with special status

NORTH UNIT VISITOR CENTER

The National Park Service (NPS) has identified four potential building site alternatives in an Environmental Assessment for visitor center replacement in the North Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The park abandoned the former visitor center in 2013 because of recurring structural issues. The replacement facility will be the same size as the previous building, but will have only one level. Three of the four sites are in close proximity to the abandoned building location and the fourth site is located 700 feet to the west. The park has not established a preferred alternative.



Federal agencies use Environmental Assessments to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act and the National Historic Preservation Act. These documents are valuable planning tools that describe why a project is needed, explore a reasonable range of alternatives, and analyze impacts to park natural and cultural resources and values. Mitigation measures can be employed when unacceptable impacts are determined in the analysis. The public is encouraged to provide input on the project and the four alternative locations evaluated in the document. Tentatively, at least one public meeting will be scheduled for mid-June to allow the public to ask questions of park staff and provide input for the final site selection.

During the summer of 2014, a temporary visitor center was located six miles from the park's North Unit entrance in the Juniper Campground. The replacement project will take several years to complete and the park is currently installing two trailers at the park's entrance to provide visitor services and administrative offices. Communication equipment and electricity are being installed and the temporary facility is expected to be operational in July.

"It is important that we hear from the public during the planning process to replace the failed North Unit Visitor Center," said Acting Superintendent Wendy Ross. "The park is an essential recreational component of the greater Watford City, Williston, and Dickinson communities. We look forward to completing a project that will meet the needs of a growing and diverse population."

PRESCRIBED BURN

During the second and third weeks of May, the weather was just right for a prescribed burn. Vegetation was burned in the North Unit and South Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. As Acting Superintendent Wendy Ross stated in a press release, "Careful prescribed fire application combined with regulation of bison, elk, and feral horse populations is an important vegetation and habitat management tool. Natural fire episodes are essential for native species growth and ecosystem balance in the Little Missouri Badlands."

In the months following the burn, those areas burned will begin to show signs of new, fresh, and healthy vegetation growth. The benefits of the burn will be apparent and easy to see around the Painted Canyon parking lot, right off the Interstate 94, and is well worth checking out when you are passing by this summer.

TIPS FOR DAY HIKING

Plan - Know your own limits and plan your route with a map and GPS accordingly; then let someone else know exactly where you are going.

Pack - The heaviest things in your pack should be plenty of water and high energy snacks. One quart of water per hour per person is generally a good amount.

Pay Attention - Before you set out on the trail, check the weather and trail conditions at the nearest visitor center. During your time on the trail, keep an eye out for local plants, animals, or terrain that may pose a safety threat.





Wendy Ross, a 21-year veteran of the National Park Service (NPS), has been selected as the new Superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Ross has served as the Superintendent of Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site in Stanton, North Dakota since April 2011. She spent the last eight months as the Acting Superintendent at Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Ross begins her new assignment July 12, 2015.

"I am pleased to welcome Wendy Ross as the next Superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Park," stated Midwest Regional Director Cameron Sholly. "Wendy is an outstanding leader and will do a tremendous job in this position. She has a great blend of experiences and a proven track record of solving complex problems through innovation and relationship building."

Ross said, "I have an intense personal connection to Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Like President Roosevelt, I found solace in the badlands when I was young and impressionable. Prior to her NPS career, Ross served as a Peace Corps Volunteer, facilitating an agricultural loan program for rural farmers in Radawana, Sri Lanka. As a result, she speaks the Singhalese language fluently.

Ross is married to Scott Ross, a journeyman electrician and native of Cheyenne, Wyoming. They are avid outdoor enthusiasts and enjoy spending time skiing, biking, hiking, fishing and camping.

KNIFE RIVER RECIEVES PINNACLE AWARD



Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site has been awarded the coveted Pinnacle Award for the 2014-2015 school year. The Pinnacle Award is presented annually by the Center for Interactive Learning and Collaboration (CILC), to organizations that receive outstanding scores on program evaluations submitted by participating educators. The CILC is recognized nationally and internationally as the leader in content aggregation, consulting and support services that assist organizations with the videoconferencing utilization of and other collaborative technologies.

HOPPING INTO A NEW SEASON: RUBBER RABBITBRUSH



There are many ways to tell that the summer season is winding down around Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The annual astronomy festival is on our minds, interns return to their college schedules, and, across the dusty badlands and browning grasses, rubber rabbitbrush begins to steal the show.

Name: Rubber Rabbitbrush (Chrysothamnus nauseosus)

Height: 1-3 foot (or taller!)

Description: branched shrub with straight, narrow, alternate leaves, and clusters of small, yellow flowers

Habitat: found on dry slopes, thrives in clay soils

Uses: By Native Americans for yellow dye and medicinal tea; by large mammals for winter forage; by small mammals (like jackrabbits) and birds for cover

EVERY KID IN A PARK!



Medora, ND – Theodore Roosevelt National Park invites all 4th grade students to visit the park for free as part of the White House's new Every Kid in a Park program. Starting September 1, 4th grade students can now go to the Every Kid in a Park website to complete an activity and obtain a free

annual entry pass to more than 2,000 federal recreation areas, including national parks.

"During the National Park Service's centennial celebration, we want everyone to get to know their national parks, and we're offering a special invitation to fourth graders and their families to discover everything that national parks offer," said National Park Service Director Jonathan B. Jarvis. "We hope these free passes for fourth graders will introduce 4th graders, their classes, and families to our national treasures, places where they can run and play, explore and learn."

Theodore Roosevelt National Park offers a variety of activities that fourth graders and their families can enjoy, including the annual Dakota Nights Astronomy Festival on September 11 - 13, a Junior Ranger Program,

astronomy programs and full moon hikes during the summer, and Family Fun Packs to borrow.

To receive their free pass for national parks, fourth graders can visit www.everykidinapark.gov and play a game to receive a pass voucher. Fourth graders and their families can then exchange the voucher for the free pass, which will provide entry to national parks and other federal public lands and waters across the country from September 1st, 2015 through August 31, 2016. The website also includes fun and engaging learning activities aligned to educational standards, trip planning tools, safety and packing tips and other important and helpful information for educators and parents.

In addition to providing every fourth grader in America a free entry pass for national parks and federal public lands and waters, fourth grade educators, youth group leaders and their students across the country will also participate in the program through field trips and other learning experiences. Theodore Roosevelt National Park's website features a virtual tour of Theodore Roosevelt's Maltese Cross Cabin, curriculum materials, and field trip guides for educators.

The goal of the Every Kid in a Park program is to connect 4th graders with the great outdoors and inspire them to become future environmental stewards, ready to preserve and protect national parks and other public lands for years to come. The program is an important part of the National Park Service's centennial celebration in 2016, which encourages everyone to Find Your Park.

Every Kid in a Park is an administrative-wide effort, launched by President Obama, and supported by eight federal agencies, including the National Park Service, the Army Corps of Engineers, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, Department of Education, Fish and Wildlife Service, Forest Service, and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.



Lifeways of the Northern Plains

Lifeways of the Northern Plains transformed Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site into an outdoor classroom, making history come alive for students studying North Dakota history on September 15, 16, 17 & 18, 2015. The 2015 event had a record setting attendance of 1,430 students from all across North Dakota.

The week's success can be attributed in large part to the direct support of the Theodore Roosevelt Nature and History Association (TRNHA). With TRNHA's support, the park was able to provide the following materials and presenters:

Groups of students rotated through six different activity stations in the course of their 4-hour visits. Students visited a full-scale earthlodge and learned about life in the traditional Hidatsa dwelling. Keith Bear, a renowned Mandan-Hidatsa flute player and storyteller, played a varie-ty of his personal hand-made flutes, and described the role of the flute in Mandan-Hidatsa tribal life. Chris Floyd, a historical reenactor, explained the importance of sign language used on the Northern Plains, and taught the students how to sign many words. Medallions of the Thunderbird symbol were provided to each of the students. Purposes for the medallion and stories of the Thunderbird were told as students exercised their artistic flair by decorating their own medallions to take home with them. Park Rangers assisted students with reconstructing the foundational wooden framework of a kid-sized earthlodge. Finally, the students enjoyed trying their hand at throwing the atlatl, a prehistoric hunting tool, which was one of the highlights of the day.

Teachers praised the program:

"That was the best field trip ever. I absolutely loved the excursion. Can't wait to do it again next year... What a great way to get the kids involved!!!!"

"My students loved all the stations and talked about it on the way home. (Lifeways) is so organized and appropriate for their grade level."

This year was the 10-year anniversary of the program which has grown from a one-day event to four days.

Prescribed Fire Planned at TRNP

MEDORA, ND: The National Park Service will implement a small prescribed fire project in Theodore Roosevelt National Park's South Unit this fall.

A strip of approximately 25-35 feet immediately adjacent to the South Unit Scenic Drive will be burned in numerous areas to provide a safety zone or "black line." An estimated 20 to 40 acres is scheduled to burn in early November. This project is in preparation for a larger prescribed burn in the unit's interior, which will occur in spring 2016.



"Prescribed fire continues to be a primary management tool in maintaining the vegetation community typical of the Little Missouri Badlands," said Chief of Resource Management Bill Whitworth. "This, in turn, supports the variety of native wildlife in the park, particularly large grazers like bison, elk, and feral horses. This burn will make the spring burn safer and more efficient."

The park will notify local fire departments and law enforcement agencies, post signs along park roads and in the



visitor center, and update the park's website to notify the public if conditions remain favorable for burning. Other federal land management agencies will assist National Park Service personnel to carry out the prescribed burns. Portions of the South Unit road system may be closed temporarily for visitor safety.

Theodore Roosevelt NP Trails Get a Facelift!

Theodore Roosevelt National Park hosted an inaugural Student Conservation Association trail corps during the 2015 field season. Funded by entrance fees collected at the Park, the team improved two high—use front country trails, Painted Canyon and Ridgeline Nature trails. Both trails were overgrown with brush and prairie grass, and damaged by wind, water erosion, and wildlife, such as bison and feral horses. The SCA trail corps successfully improved the tread, constructed new drainage structures, decommissioned several social trails, and installed new signage to make the trails easier to navigate.





NPS 100th Anniversary Commemorative Coin Design Unveiled

Designs for commemorative coins honoring the 100th anniversary of the National Park Service (NPS) were unveiled during a ceremony at the Department of the Interior. NPS Director Jonathan B. Jarvis and National Park Foundation (NPF) President and Chief Executive Officer Will Shafroth joined Treasurer of the United States Rosie Rios for the unveiling.

Public Law 113-291 authorizes a three-coin program of \$5 gold, \$1 silver and half-dollar clad coins with designs emblematic of the 100th anniversary of the National Park Service.

"Heads or tails, this Centennial commemorative coin helps to honor the National Park Service's first century of service to protect, preserve, and share some of our nation's greatest natural resources, culture and history," said Jarvis. "The coins will be a fun centennial collectible, and the proceeds will contribute to our second century of service to the American people."

Pricing for the National Park Service Commemorative Coins will include surcharges—\$35 for each gold coin, \$10 for each silver coin, and \$5 for each half-dollar clad coin—which are authorized to be paid to the NPF. The funds are to be used for projects that help preserve and protect resources under the stewardship of the NPS and promote public enjoyment and appreciation of these resources.

"When fully realized, the potential impact derived from the commemorative coin sales will be tremendous," said Shafroth. "The funds will improve trails, introduce more young people to the parks, and connect our citizens to the history and culture of our nation."



The gold coin obverse (heads side) features John Muir and Theodore Roosevelt with Yosemite National Park's Half Dome in the background. Inscriptions are "LIBERTY," "2016" and "IN GOD WE TRUST." United States Mint Sculptor-Engraver Don Everhart designed and sculpted the obverse.

The gold coin reverse (tails side) features the NPS logo, with the inscriptions "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA," "E PLURIBUS UNUM" and "\$5." Everhart also designed and sculpted the reverse.

The silver coin obverse features Yellowstone National Park's Old Faithful geyser and a bison, with the inscriptions "LIBERTY," "NATIONAL PARK SERVICE CENTENNIAL," "IN GOD WE TRUST" and "1916-2016." United States Mint Sculptor-Engraver Joseph Menna designed and sculpted the obverse.

The silver coin reverse depicts a Latina Folklórico dancer and the NPS logo, representing the multi-faceted cultural experience found in America's national parks. Inscriptions are "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA," "E PLURIBUS UNUM," "\$1" "HERITAGE," "CULTURE" and "PRIDE." The reverse was designed by Artistic Infusion Program (AIP) artist Chris Costello and

sculpted by United States Mint Sculptor-Engraver Jim Licaretz.

The clad half-dollar obverse features a hiker discovering the majesty of the wilderness and a small child discovering a frog hiding in ferns, celebrating the diversity and breadth of the NPS. Inscriptions are "LIBERTY," "2016," "IN GOD WE TRUST," "1916" and "NATIONAL PARK SERVICE." The reverse was designed by AIP artist Barbara Fox and will be sculpted by United States Mint Sculptor-Engraver Michael Gaudioso.

The clad half-dollar reverse features the NPS logo, with the inscriptions "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA," "E PLURIBUS UNUM," "HALF DOLLAR," "STEWARDSHIP" and "RECREATION." The reverse was designed by AIP artist Thomas Hipschen and sculpted by United States Mint Sculptor-Engraver Charles L. Vickers.

"The Centennial commemorative coin serves as a lasting tribute to 100 years of the National Park Service – 'America's Best Idea'," said Secretary of the Interior Sally Jewell. "Whether these coins are kept in a safe place at home or given as a gift to the next generation, they serve as a lasting reminder that our nation is blessed with unique natural, cultural and historical treasures. Proceeds from these coins will ensure that our nation's rich stories and spectacular natural places will thrive in their second century and beyond."

The United States Mint will announce the coins' release date and additional pricing information prior to their release in 2016. The commemorative coin is one of many incredible ways to celebrate the 2016 centennial. Find out more at www.findyourpark.com.
