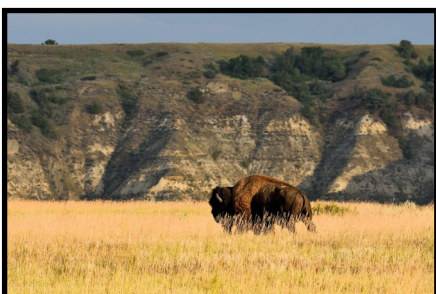

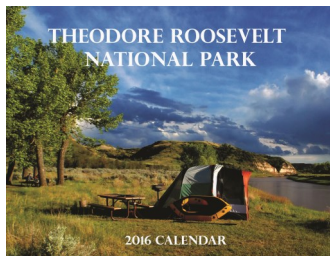

Happy New Year from Superintendent Wendy Ross

Happy New Year! We just kicked 2016 off with an invigorating hike at Makoshika State Park south of Glendive, Montana. Several park staff came out with us to launch our year-long celebration of the National Park Service (NPS) Centennial. What better way to celebrate than to share an outdoor experience in our ecological “neighborhood” with our state partners in preservation. You will see the “find your park” slogan in many NPS publications and promotions. We are embracing that ideology in Theodore Roosevelt National Park this year with a focus on promoting all of the amazing places that Western North Dakota and Eastern Montana have to offer. Your park doesn’t have to be a designated national park. A neighborhood park, a state protected area, a bike path corridor, a national heritage area, a wildlife refuge, a rooftop garden, a green space of your own- each of these fit the idea of getting out, breathing deep, staying healthy, reducing stress, learning about our heritage, and reveling in the natural resources around us.



The past year was a difficult one for Theodore Roosevelt National Park and Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site. We continued to meet the challenges of energy development surrounding our parks. The slowdown in oil production increased our focus on external infrastructure development projects- roads, pipelines, bridges, and utilities. Internally, we discovered that NPS sites in North Dakota have had an exceptionally high employee turnover rate of 87% over the past five years. We remained short staffed in both parks during the whole year due to budget limitations, complex hiring processes, and vacancies. You might have noticed that facilities were understaffed or programs were reduced. Temporary trailers were brought in from Minute Man Missile National Historic Site to replace the abandoned North Unit Visitor Center. North Unit visitor services were finally up and running in August after months of logistical difficulties. We pulled together, found innovative solutions, and accomplished more than expected in 2015. Thanks to TRNHA support, the Theodore Roosevelt National Park Dakota Nights Astronomy Festival doubled its attendance in 2015. TRNHA financially supported the 10th annual Lifeways program, with participation from 1430 students and more than 25 North Dakota schools. Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site developed this educational program a decade ago and it is more popular than ever. TRNHA made these milestones possible.



As we leave these difficulties behind and move into a new year, I can’t help but be optimistic. Congress just passed a budget that is the most robust the NPS has ever received. The Centennial celebration will be a salute to our past, but more importantly a portal to a future unimagined by those who came before us. Our communities have grown and become more diverse. The possibilities for educational, partnership, and service opportunities are endless. We look forward to exploring ways we can work together to care for our national treasures and provide new experiences to those who will become future park advocates. We aim to become relevant to younger generations by developing programs that spark awe and curiosity. We rely on those who already love our parks to help us in this endeavor. The “Every Kid in a Park” campaign will give all 4th graders an opportunity to get a free annual national park pass that will allow them and their families to become familiar with national parks. Our NPS sites are fortunate to have the support of wonderful people like you and we are deeply grateful for all that you do to keep America’s best idea alive. I look forward to celebrating with you!

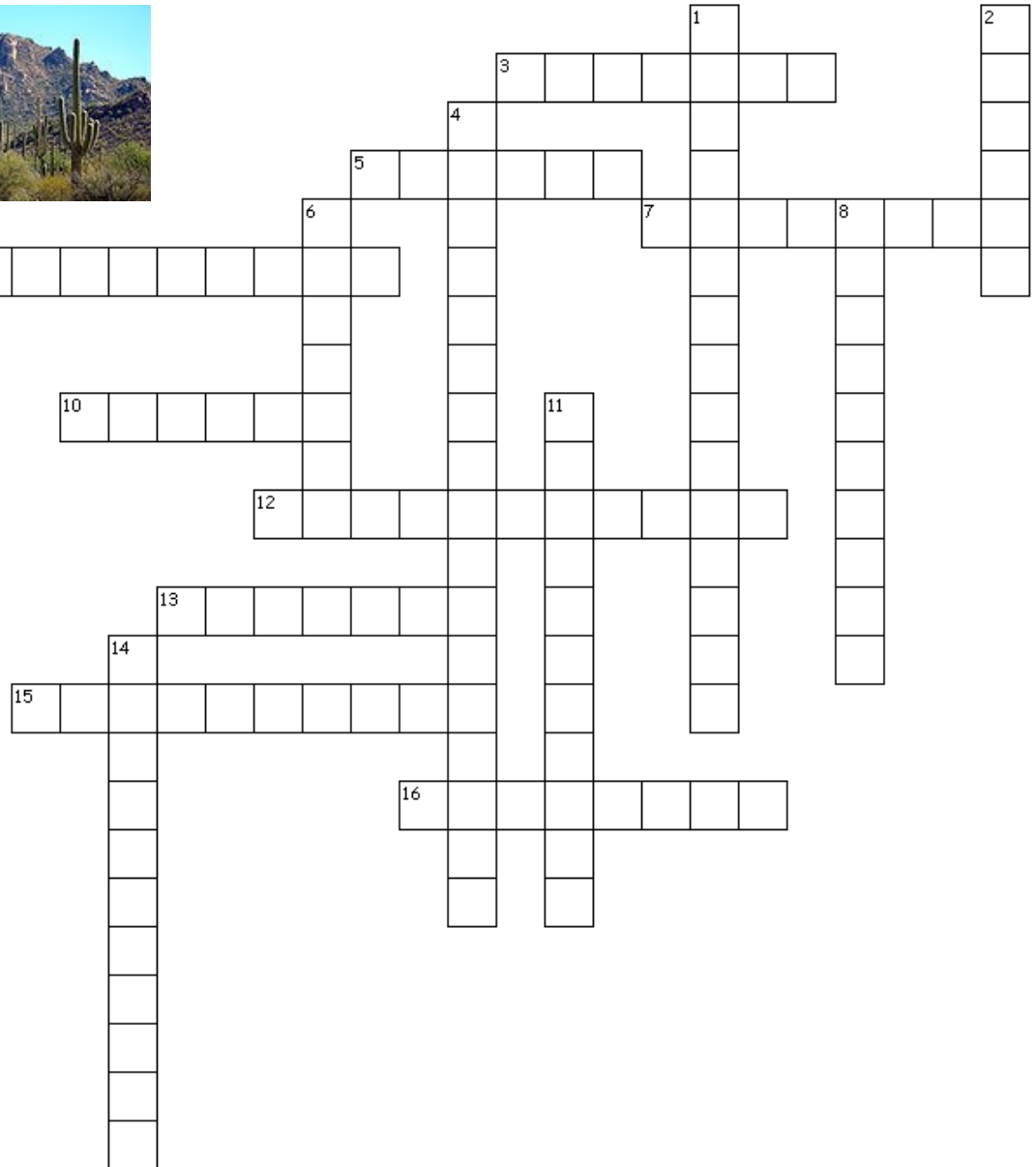

TRNP Releases EA for Cell Tower Replacement

Theodore Roosevelt National Park invites the public to provide feedback on an Environmental Assessment (EA) for the replacement of its North Unit communications tower. The current tower provides communication functions essential to public safety and efficient operations for the park and the U.S. Forest Service (USFS). It is located within the park boundary on the east side of Hwy 85 in McKenzie County, just north of the park entrance.

The NPS will issue a permit to Verizon Wireless to replace the existing 220 foot tall guyed radio tower with aviation safety lighting with a 190 foot guyed tower without a flashing red light. Verizon Wireless will co-locate its telecommunications equipment on the tower and construct a slightly larger support shed to accommodate National Park Service (NPS), USFS, and Verizon equipment. Gravel will be added to the existing access road.

“Allowing Verizon to co-locate its equipment will eliminate the need to construct a second, highly visible telecommunications tower in the area”, said Chief of Resource Management Bill Whitworth. “Because of the tower’s reduced height, a blinking light on top will no longer be required, improving the quality of the viewshed to those visiting park wilderness and other backcountry sites. Given the rate of development in the Bakken, this is a rare opportunity to share resources and reduce cell tower proliferation in the region.”

The public is invited to provide comment on the EA through the NPS Planning Environment and Public Comment System (PEPC) at <http://parkplanning.nps.gov/parkHome.cfm?parkID=167>. The website provides links to the document and its attachments and instructions on how to comment in the public comment database. The comment period is from January 22 to February 22, 2016. If you are unable to view the document or provide comments before February 22 and still desire to do so, please contact the park to request an extension. Comments may be submitted directly on the website database or by letter addressed to Superintendent, Theodore Roosevelt National Park, P.O. Box 7, Medora, ND 58645.

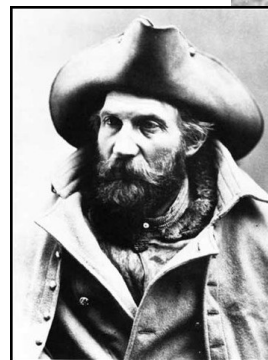

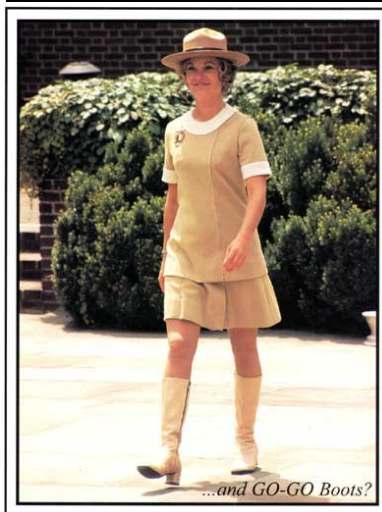

Celebrating 100 years in Uniform

Let's kick off the centennial by taking a stroll down memory lane. National Park Service uniforms have changed a lot throughout the last 100 years. Basic uniforms for the very first park rangers were just like any other outdoorsman only with a badge. Standard uniforms weren't established until the 1920s and have changed a lot over the years. Throughout the years iconic items such as the badges, arrow-head patches, and flat hats became part of every ranger's uniform. Women weren't seen in the NPS until the late 1920s and then it was mostly in an office setting. The first female naturalist at Grand Canyon, Pauline Mead, worked from 1929-31 and wore a man's uniform.

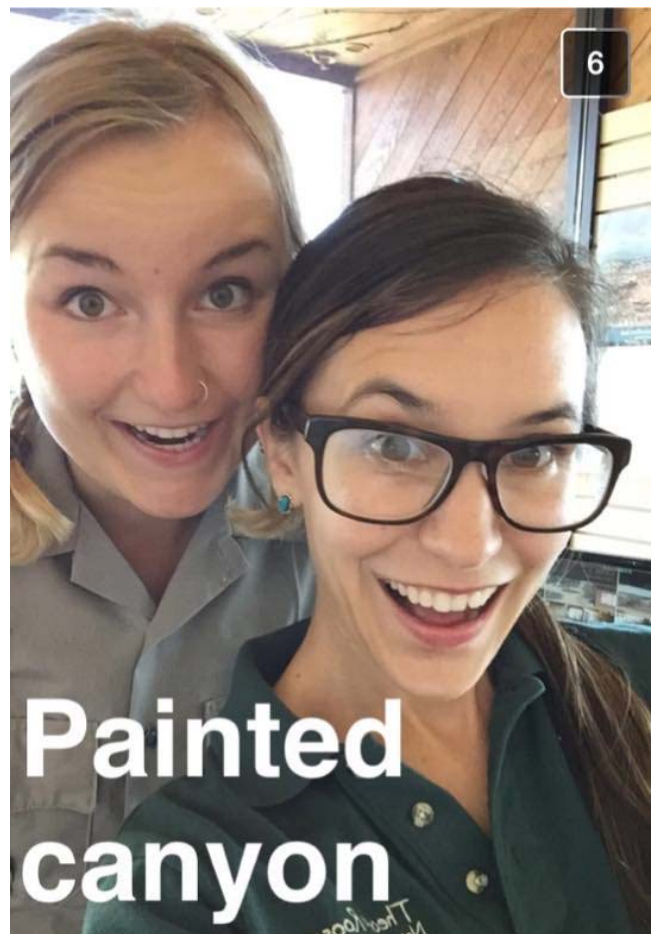

NPS 100th Anniversary to be Celebrated on Forever Stamps!

WASHINGTON, March 31, 2016 (GLOBE NEWSWIRE) -- The U.S. Postal Service will begin celebrating the National Park Service's Aug. 25 centennial just in time for summer vacation letter writing by issuing a pane of stunning Forever stamps depicting 16 examples of our national treasures on June 2.

To create buzz and excitement among national park fans, each stamp will be previewed alphabetically over the next three weeks, beginning Monday, April 4.

"These stamps celebrate the 100th anniversary of the National Parks and depict the beauty and diversity of these national treasures," said Postmaster General Megan J. Brennan. "They serve as an inspiration for Americans to visit, learn and to write cherished memories of their trips to these incredible wonders."

"This set of stamps will take people on a journey to some of the most amazing places in the world," said National Park Service Director Jonathan B. Jarvis. "We are thrilled that the 16 national park stamps issued in '16 for the centennial depict the variety of parks that collectively tell the story of our country."

The June 2 first-day-of-issue ceremony will take place at New York City's Javits Center at 11 a.m. as part of World Stamp Show NY-2016. Dedication ceremonies also will take place at or near each of the national parks depicted on the stamps. Individuals are asked to spread the news on social media by using the hashtags #FindYourPark or #NPS100.

We can't wait to see if Theodore Roosevelt National Park gets a stamp!

TRNP to Offer Electronic Entrance Passes

MEDORA, ND: The National Park Service has begun a pilot program to sell online electronic entrance passes to selected national park units through the "Your Pass Now" program. Visitors will be able to purchase annual and seven-day passes at their convenience in advance of their park visit.

Theodore Roosevelt and Acadia National Parks, and Colorado National Monument passes can be purchased at www.yourpassnow.com. There is no additional cost for electronic passes.

"Your Pass Now" was developed by NIC, Inc. in partnership with the National Park Service to better serve national park visitors. Additional electronic entrance pass systems are being tested for Everglades and Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks, and San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park.

Once purchased, electronic passes may be printed or can reside on a mobile device for use at the park on the date of purchase or at a specified future date. Park staff will validate them upon presentation at the park. Specific instructions for the electronic passes will be provided when they are purchased. Passes are non-refundable, non-transferrable, and non-replaceable if lost or stolen.

Entrance fees collected at Theodore Roosevelt National Park are used to provide services which directly benefit visitors and to maintain and enhance visitor facilities.

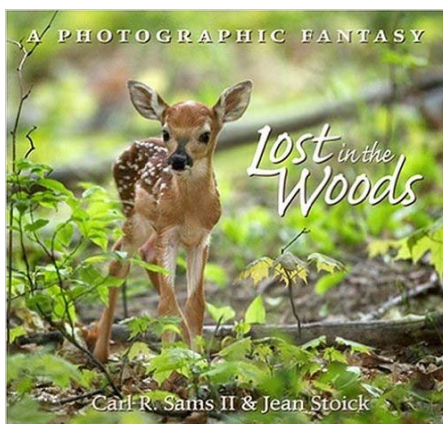

Tourism to TRNP Creates Millions in Economic Benefits

MEDORE, ND: A new National Park Service (NPS) report shows that visitors to Fort Union Trading Post National Historic Site, Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site, and Theodore Roosevelt National Park in 2015 spent 39.959 million in communities near these parks. That spending supported 516 jobs in the surrounding areas.

The parks welcome visitors from across the country and around the world and, according to North Dakota Superintendent Wendy Ross, “National Park tourism is a significant driver in the U.S. economy—returning \$10 for every \$1 invested in the NPS—and it’s also a big factor in our local economy.”

The peer reviewed visitor spending analysis was conducted by economists Catherine Cullinane Thomas of the U.S. Geological Survey and Lynne Koontz for the NPS. The report shows \$16.9 billion of direct spending by 307.2 million park visitors in communities within 60 miles of a national park. This spending supported 295,000 jobs nationally, with

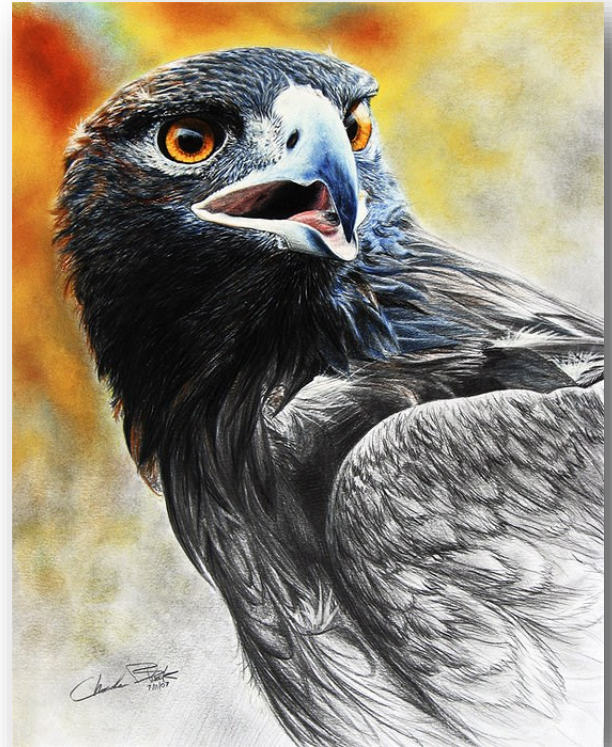

252,000 jobs found in these gateway communities, and had a cumulative benefit to the U.S. economy of \$32 billion.

According to the 2015 report, most park visitor spending was for lodging (31.1%), followed by food/beverages (20.2%), gas and oil (11.8%), admissions and fees (10.2%), and souvenirs and other expenses (9.8%).

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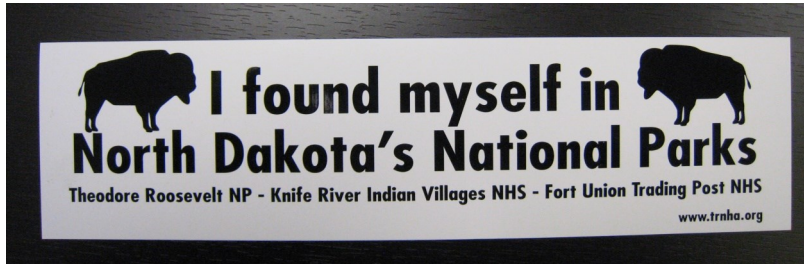


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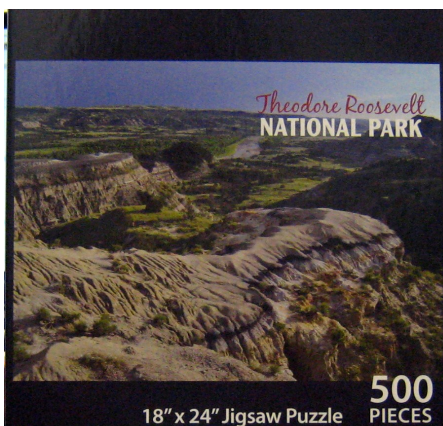

FIRST-EVER NPS ARCHEOBLITZ GREAT SUCCESS!

The first-ever NPS Archeoblitz took place at Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site on May 5-7 and engaged 250 middle-school students in archeological research. The first two days gave students from local area schools the rare opportunity to conduct archeological field work. These students worked closely with professionals to collect viable data for research across sub-disciplines.

The students, paired with archeologists, mapped the surface near burrowing mammal holes, sorted artifacts into basic material classes, used geophysical techniques, and even conducted small diameter coring to better understand the occupation history of an earthlodge. Throughout all of this, students learned how to accurately document their findings with maps and field notes so that these collections could be used for future research.

The third day was open to the public, including Native performing arts groups, research presentations, and interpretive events throughout the day.

Going beyond the job description, they shared their enthusiasm and unique perspective on the resources at Knife River Indian Villages National Historic Site, enriching the experience for all. They have truly become part of the NPS family.

Archeoblitz was a grand three-day gathering of minds and expertise, all sharing a common passion and goal. A pilot-study of sorts, this collaboration was the very first of its kind to occur in the United States with the National Park Service. The Archeoblitz would not have been possible without the monumental collaborative effort that was put forth by many partners, namely:

Are you a geology buff? Don't take this lecture for granite!

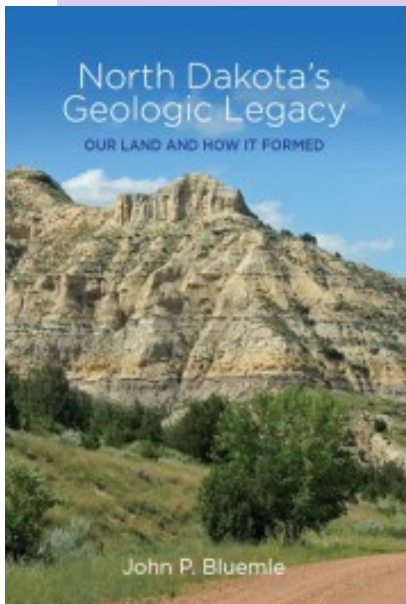
Join John Bluemle as he shares his love of geology and North Dakota with a special presentation about his book North Dakota's Geologic Legacy.

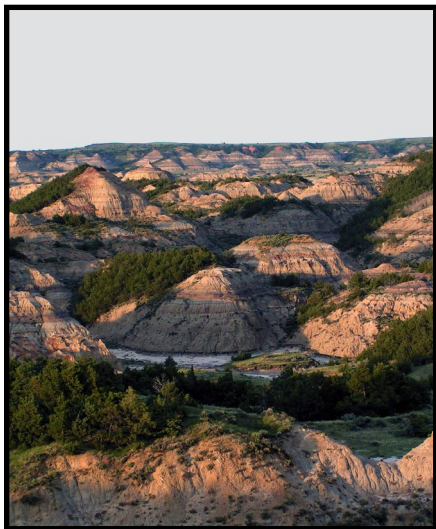


North Dakota's Geologic Legacy is the story of the landscape — why it looks like it does and how it formed. The book is designed for physical and arm-chair travelers. Most of the features portrayed can be seen from the road. The shape of the land, the geologic materials, the processes that shaped them, the length of time involved in their formation — all of these comprise a fascinating puzzle.

North Dakota has a split geologic personality: rugged, erosional badlands and buttes in the southwest, formed during tens of millions of years, juxtaposed with a much younger, rolling landscape shaped by glaciers to the east and north. Separating the two styles of geology is the Missouri River, itself unsure of its own geology, a combination of the young, the very old and time in between. 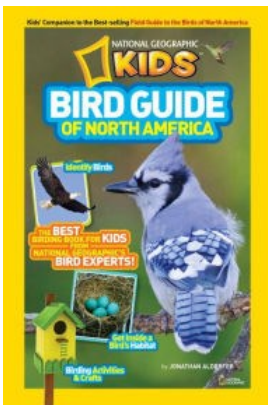



15 FACTS ABOUT OUR NATIONAL MAMMAL: THE AMERICAN BISON

On May 9, 2016, President Obama signed the National Bison Legacy Act into law, officially making the American bison the national mammal of the United States. This majestic animal joins the ranks of the Bald Eagle as the official symbol of our country -- and much like the eagle, it's one of the greatest conservation success stories of all time. In prehistoric times, millions of bison roamed North America -- from the forests of Alaska and the grasslands of Mexico to Nevada's Great Basin and the eastern Appalachian Mountains. But by the late 1800s, there were only a few hundred bison left in the United States after European settlers pushed west, reducing the animal's habitat and hunting the bison to near extinction. Had it not been for a few private individuals working with tribes, states and the Interior Department, the bison would be extinct today.

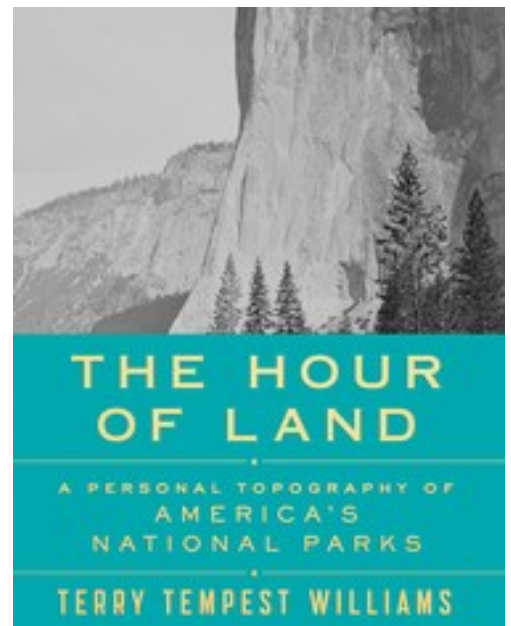
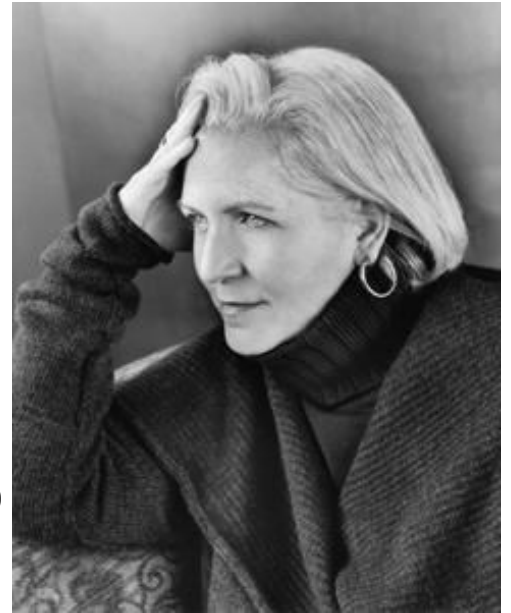
TERRY TEMPEST WILLIAMS - THE HOUR OF LAND

For years, America's national parks have provided public breathing spaces in a world in which such spaces are steadily disappearing, which is why close to 300 million people visit the parks each year. Now, to honor the centennial of the National Park Service, Terry Tempest Williams, the author of the beloved memoir *When Women Were Birds*, returns with *The Hour of Land*, a literary celebration of our national parks, what they mean to us, and what we mean to them.

Through twelve carefully chosen parks, from Yellowstone in Wyoming to Acadia in Maine to Big Bend in Texas, Tempest Williams creates a series of lyrical portraits that illuminate the unique grandeur of each place while delving into what it means to shape a landscape with its own evolutionary history into something of our own making. Part memoir, part natural history, and part social critique, *The Hour of Land* is a meditation and manifesto on why wild lands matter to the soul of America. Our national parks stand at the intersection of humanity and wildness, and there's no one better than Tempest Williams to guide us there. Beautifully illustrated, with evocative black-and-white images by some of our finest photographers, from Lee Friedlander to Sally Mann to Sebastião Salgado, this book will be a collector's item as well as a seminal work of environmental writing and criticism about some of America's most treasured landmarks.



Terry Tempest Williams is the award-winning author of fourteen books, including *Refuge: An Unnatural History of Family and Place*, *Finding Beauty in a Broken World*, and *When Women Were Birds*. Her work has been widely anthologized around the world. She divides her time between Castle Valley, Utah, and Moose, Wyoming.

1. Bison are the largest mammal in North America. Male bison (called bulls) weigh up to 2,000 pounds and stand 6 feet tall, while females (called cows) weigh up to 1,000 pounds and reach a height of 4-5 feet. [Bison calves weigh 30-70 pounds at birth.](#)

2. Since the late 19th century, Interior has been the primary national conservation steward of the bison. Public lands managed by Interior support 17 bison herds -- or approximately 10,000 bison -- in 12 states, [including Alaska.](#)

3. What's the difference between bison and buffalo? While bison and buffalo are used interchangeably, in North America the scientific name is bison. Actually, it's *Bison bison bison* ([genus: Bison, species: bison, subspecies: bison](#)), but only saying it once is fine. [Historians believe that the term "buffalo" grew from the French word for beef, "boeuf."](#)

4. Yellowstone National Park is the only place in the U.S. where bison have continuously lived since prehistoric times. What makes Yellowstone's bison so special is that they're the [pure descendants \(free of cattle genes\) of early bison](#) that roamed our country's grasslands. As of July 2015, Yellowstone's bison population was estimated at 4,900 -- making it the largest bison population on public lands.

5. What's a "red dog"? It's a baby bison. Bison calves tend to be [born from late March through May](#) and are [orange-red in color](#), earning them the nickname "red dogs." After a few months, their hair starts to change to dark brown and their characteristic shoulder hump and horns begin to grow.

6. The history of bison and Native Americans are intertwined. Bison have been integral to tribal culture, providing them with food, clothing, fuel, tools, shelter and spiritual value. Established in 1992, the [Inter Tribal Buffalo Council](#) works with the National Park Service to transfer bison from national park lands to tribal lands.

7. You can judge a bison's mood by its tail. When it hangs down and switches naturally, the bison is usually calm. [If the tail is standing straight up, watch out!](#) It may be ready to charge. No matter what a bison's tail is doing, remember that they are unpredictable and can charge at any moment. Every year, there are regrettable accidents caused by people getting too close to these massive animals. It's great to love the bison, but love them from a distance.

8. Wind Cave National Park's herd helped revive bison populations around the country. The story starts in 1905 with the formation of the American Bison Society and a breeding program at the New York City Zoo (today, the Bronx Zoo). By 1913, the American Bison Society had enough bison to restore a free-ranging bison herd. Working with Interior, they [donated 14 bison to Wind Cave National Park](#) in South Dakota. More than 100 years later, the bison from Wind Cave have helped [reestablishing other herds across the United States and most recently in Mexico.](#)

9. Bison may be big, but they're also fast. [They can run up to 35 miles per hour.](#) Plus, they're extremely agile. Bison can spin around quickly, jump high fences and are strong swimmers.

10. Pass the salad, please. Bison primarily eat grasses, weeds and leafy plants -- [typically foraging for 9-11 hours a day.](#) That's where

the bison's large protruding shoulder hump comes in handy during the winter. It allows them to swing their heads from side-to-side to clear snow -- especially for creating foraging patches. [Learn how bison's feeding habits can help ensure diversity of prairie plant species especially after a fire.](#)

11. From hunter to conservationist, Teddy Roosevelt helped save bison from extinction. In 1883, Teddy Roosevelt traveled to the [Dakota Territory to hunt bison](#). After spending a few years in the west, Roosevelt returned to New York with a new outlook on life. He paved the way for the conservation movement, and in 1905, formed the [American Bison Society](#) with William Hornaday to save the disappearing bison. Today bison live in all 50 states, including Native American lands, wildlife refuges, national parks and private lands.

12. Bison can live up to 20 years old. [The average lifespan for a bison is 10-20 years](#), but some live to be older. Cows begin breeding at the age of 2 and only have one baby at a time. For males, the prime breeding age is 6-10 years. [Learn how Interior works to ensure genetic diversity and long-term viability of bison.](#)

13. A little dirt won't hurt. Called [wallowing](#), bison roll in the dirt to deter biting flies and help shed fur. Male bison also wallow during mating season to leave behind their scent and display their strength.

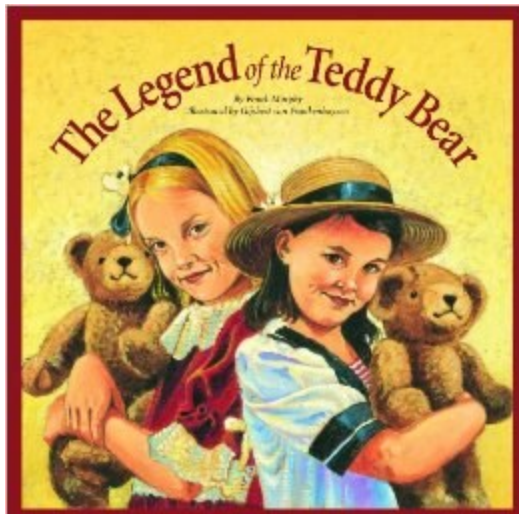
14. The American bison's ancestors can be traced to southern Asia thousands of years ago. Bison made their way to America by crossing the ancient land bridge that once connected Asia with North America during the Pliocene Epoch, some 400,000 years ago. These ancient animals were much larger than the iconic bison we love today. [Fossil records show that one prehistoric bison, *Bison latifrons*, had horns measuring 9 feet from tip to tip.](#)

15. Bison are nearsighted -- who knew? While bison have poor eyesight, they have excellent senses of smell and hearing. Cows and calves communicate using pig-like grunts, and during mating season, [bulls can be heard bellowing](#) across long distances.

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

RELEASE OF TRNP QUARTER DOLLAR COIN

The release of the Theodore Roosevelt National Park quarter dollar coin, the 34th coin of the U.S. Mint America the Beautiful Quarters Program, will take place at Theodore Roosevelt National Park on August 25th, the 100th birthday of the National Park Service. This exciting event will take place at the park's Painted Canyon Visitor Center at 10:00 a.m. MDT and is part of the National Park Service's Centennial celebration.

The event is free and open to the public. All children who attend will receive a brand new Theodore Roosevelt National Park quarter from the U.S. Mint. There will be a coin exchange immediately following the ceremony where coins can be obtained for face value (1-roll minimum/ 10-roll maximum, cash only).

The design on the quarter depicts a young Theodore Roosevelt on horseback surveying the Badlands terrain near the Little Missouri River in North Dakota. It was in North Dakota that Theodore Roosevelt reflected on human impacts to the remote spaces of the American West. Roosevelt's experiences in North Dakota inspired his first ideas of conserving our country's lands, wildlife, natural resources, and scenic wonders.

During his presidency (1901-1909), Theodore Roosevelt provided federal protection for more than 230 million acres of land. After Roosevelt's death in 1919, his conservation legacy prompted national interest in establishing a memorial to honor his work; North Dakota was the neutral location. The park was first created as a wildlife refuge in 1946, then became Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial Park in 1947, and was finally re-designated as Theodore Roosevelt National Park on November 10, 1978.

Theodore Roosevelt National Park memorializes Theodore Roosevelt and pays tribute to his enduring contribution to the conservation of our nation's resources by preserving and protecting the scenery, wildlife. And wilderness qualities of the North Dakota Badlands - the landscape the inspired Roosevelt and still inspires visitors today.

MEDORA, ND: Theodore Roosevelt National Park invites the public to the 32nd Annual Badlands Star Party in the park's North Unit on Friday and Saturday, August 5th and 6th.

Telescopes will be set up at the Oxbow Overlook, 14 miles from the park entrance. Constellation tours will be offered as soon as stars are visible, at approximately 10:00 p.m. CDT. The planet Saturn will be one of the objects observed. In addition, the sun can be viewed through a solar telescope at the Cannonball Concretions pullout from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. CDT on Saturday.

Nights in the North Dakota Badlands can be cool and rain is a possibility; a jacket or sweater is recommended. Caution is advised when driving in the park after dark, as bison and other wildlife may be on the road. Please call the North Unit Contact Station at 701-842-2333x1240 for further information and an updated weather forecast.

The North Dakota Badlands Star Party is presented by the Northern Sky Astronomical Society of Grand Forks, an amateur astronomy club associated with the University of North Dakota. The organization is dedicated to observing the sky and educating others about astronomy. Membership is open to the general public.

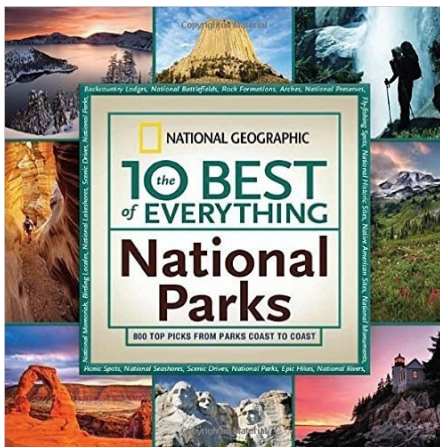

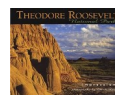

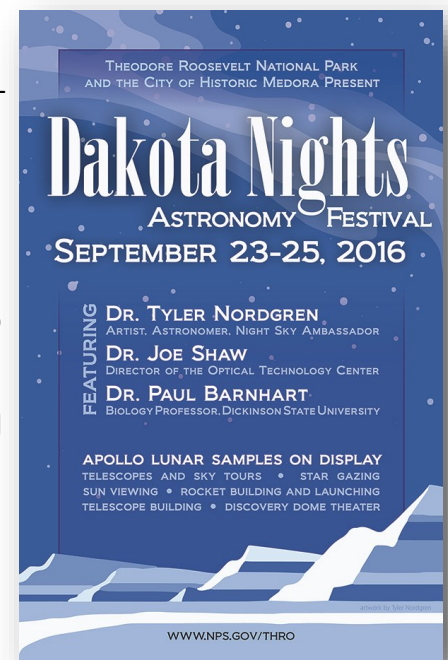

The National Park Service celebrated it's 100th anniversary on August 25, 2016! The day was particularly special to Theodore Roosevelt National Park because it also marked the release of the 2016 Theodore Roosevelt National Park quarter! In 2010, the United States Mint began issuing 56 quarter-dollar coins featuring designs depicting national parks and other national sites as part of the United States Mint America the Beautiful Quarters Program. This year marks the seventh year of the program and features the next five quarters. The 2016 National Park Quarters to be released are:

Illinois - Shawnee National Forest Quarter
Kentucky - Cumberland Gap National Historical Park Quarter
West Virginia - Harpers Ferry National Historical Park Quarter
North Dakota - Theodore Roosevelt National Park Quarter
South Carolina - Fort Moultrie (Fort Sumter National Monument) Quarter

DID YOU KNOW—the portrait of George Washington has been featured on the quarter since 1932! Now Theodore Roosevelt gets his much deserved chance to be featured as well. The Theodore Roosevelt National Park Quarter honors the site where tourists can visit the rugged terrain of the badlands, the wildlife unique to the area, or find a cottonwood tree to lie under, and find out why Theodore Roosevelt loved this area so much. The quarter depicts a young Theodore Roosevelt on horseback surveying the terrain near the Little Missouri River.

Thanks to this area, Roosevelt garnered great success as a conservationist. Bison, elk, prairie dogs, a variety of deer, birds and other animals make their home in Theodore Roosevelt National Park. Theodore Roosevelt played a great hand in the preservation of the American Bison and helped bring them back from the edge of extinction. It's a great honor for him and TRNP to be featured on the America the Beautiful Quarters.

NPS CENTENIAL BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

The National Park Service celebrated it's 100th birthday on August 25th 2016 which coincided with the release of Theodore Roosevelt National Park Quarter. Theodore Roosevelt National Park celebrated the birthday with a ceremony for the quarter release at the Painted Canyon Overlook. HOPPING INTO A NEW SEASON: RUBBER RABBITBRUSH

There are many ways to tell the summer season is winding down around Theodore Roosevelt National Park. The annual astronomy festival is on our minds, interns return to their college schedules, and, across the dusty badlands and browning grasses, rubber rabbitbrush begins to steal the show.

Name: Rubber Rabbitbrush (*Chrysothamnus nauseosus*)

Height: 1-3 foot (or taller!)

Description: branched shrub with straight, narrow, alternate leaves, and clusters of small, yellow flowers

Habitat: found on dry slopes, thrives in clay soils

Uses: By Native Americans for yellow dye and medicinal tea;
by large mammals for winter forage; by small mammals
(like jackrabbits) and birds for cover

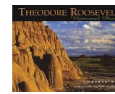

KNIFE RIVER INDIAN VILLAGES RECIEVES PINNACLE AWARD

NORTH UNIT VISITOR CENTER DEMO COMPLETE

As you may recall in July of 2013 Theodore Roosevelt National Park had no choice but to shut the doors of the North Unit visitor center when the building was condemned after an underground drainage caused the foundation to slip and crack. Badlands soils are notoriously unstable, and this was an extremely unfortunate consequence of natural processes.

The Visitor Center consisted of 4344 square feet, including basement offices. Built in 1991, it served visitors for over 20 years. In 2002, the building was raised, repaired, and stabilized due to shifting and settling. The building was fairly stable until 2011, when it shifted again. Interior walls cracked and moved, and the floor buckled. The damage was deemed not capable of being repaired.

In August 2015 trailers were placed at the park entrance as a temporary contact station for visitors to the North Unit. The planning process for a new building has begun and the old building demolition was completed in September.

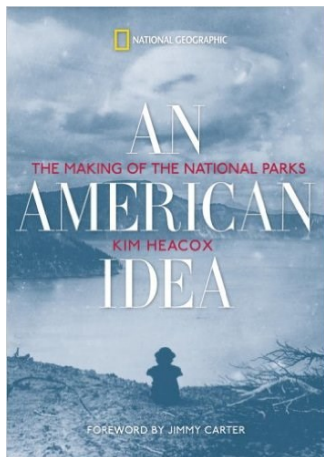

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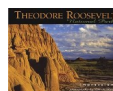

PARK'S ELK POPULATION MAINTENANCE PROGRAM RESUMES

The National Park Service will resume the annual maintenance phase of the Theodore Roosevelt National Park Elk Management Plan this week. Small groups of park staff expect to remove approximately 30 elk between November 1 and December 17th. The management goal is to maintain the number of elk between 100 and 400 animals. The past several years, the park has kept the population at 200 animals.

The South Unit's backcountry trails will not be closed during the time elk are being removed. Reduction activities could take place at any point in the seven day week depending on staff availability to provide greater program flexibility and take advantage of favorable weather conditions. Roads and overlooks, as well as Cottonwood Campground, and the four front-country trails in the South Unit - Buck Hill, Wind Canyon, Ridgeline Nature Trail, and Coal Vein Trail - will also remain open.



Although the park has Chronic Wasting Disease-free status, staff will continue to test culled elk to support North Dakota's monitoring effort for this infectious disease. Elk meat will be packed out of the park and donated to Sportsman Against Hunger through the North Dakota Community Action Partnership. The park has conducted elk management operations with little change over the past six years and this year will be no exception. Park staff will continue to use only non-leaded ammunition during the reduction.

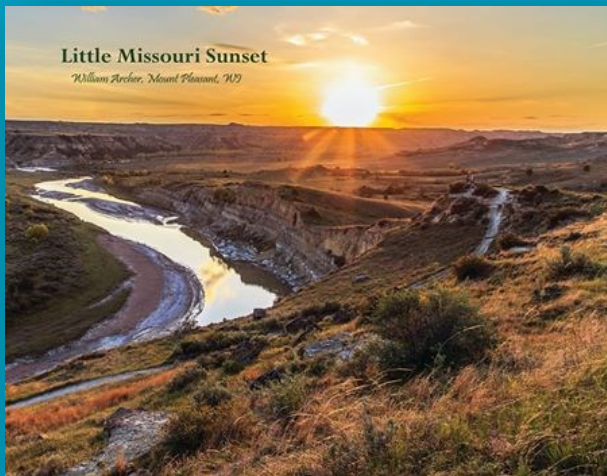
2016 PICTURE YOURSELF IN TRNP CONTEST WINNERS

The 2017 photo contest will be for photos take between September 1, 2016 and August 31, 2017. The official contest will be announced in April and we will begin accepting photos at that time.

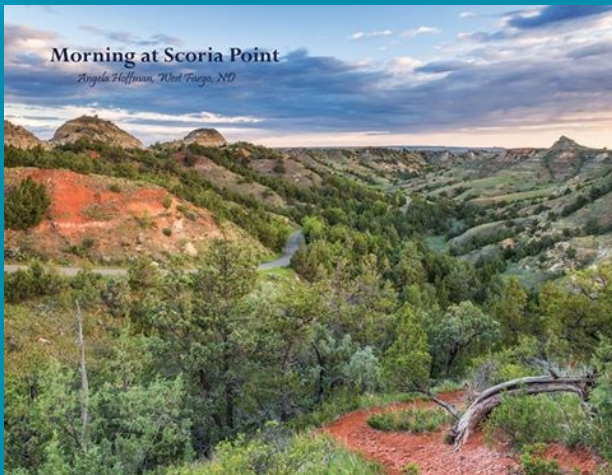

TRNP TO IMPLEMENT FINAL PHASE OF ENTRANCE FEE INCREASE

Theodore Roosevelt National Park entrance fees will increase as planned beginning January 1, 2017. This is the second part of the phased increase approved in 2015. During a 2014 open comment period, the park received 29 citizen responses; the majority were in favor of fee increases. Camping prices will not be affected by the increase. The complete fee schedule is attached.

Federal law requires recreational fees charged on public lands be used for direct visitor benefits. Monies collected through the increased entrance fees will continue to fund projects such as the multiyear wayside exhibit project, visitor services and restrooms, and trail rehabilitation.

Park annual passes and entrance fees may be purchased in advance through Your Pass Now at www.yourpassnow.com. Passes purchased electronically may reside on a mobile device or can be printed and presented upon entrance.

Entrance fees are not charged to persons under 16 years of age or to holders of Access or Military Passes. Prices for the Interagency Annual (\$80) and Senior (\$10) Passes will not change and those passes will still be available for purchase at the park. Through Every Kid in a Park, U.S. students in fourth grade have the opportunity to receive a free annual pass. Information about Every Kid in a Park may be obtained at www.everykidinapark.gov.
